BCLA is again seeking funding to support our Learn to Luge sessions for the 2022/2023 season. These sessions allow youth interested in trying the sport of luge to attend a training session at the Whistler Sliding Centre, run by a dedicated luge coach, and supported by members of the Board of Directors. Learn to Luge sessions are offered to the public with the intention of growing awareness and participation for the sport. The past 2 season we were not able to run these as planned due to Covid protocols however recently this current season we have begun to offer them again. We have lofty goals for the 2022/23 season to run double the usual number of learn to luge sessions so as to create new momentum and continue to recruit new athletes into the sport of luge.

BCLA is the Provincial Sport Organization for luge in BC. We do not receive provincial funding to support our activities. We are seeking CEP funding to continue to grow the luge program to its full potential through advertising, promotion, as well as targeting local schools to increase interest in the sport. Funds will assist in offsetting the costs of organizing the program, making it more affordable and attainable for youth to try to sport.

Learn to Luge is not new to BCLA but we have had the opportunity to continue futher refine the program. We are able to increase the number of sessions offered and to include our existing athletes to help encourage new athletes to sign up. We have had volunteers from our Board of Directors come out to speak with our new athletes and their families to help answer any questions and concerns. We would like to build on our current momentum and continue to develop and grow Learn to Luge programs in the 2022/2023 season.

Learn to Luge for this season had to be reduced due to Covid. Luge in BC has been surprisingly popular however as we are one of the few sports that has been able to keep operating within the provincial guidelines. Because of this, we have 13 new U12 athletes this season. 2006 / 2010 Olympian Peter Iliev relocated from Bulgaria to become our new head coach, assisted by 2002,2006 Olympian Mark Hatton. BCLA alumni Reid Watts, Natalie Corless and Trinity Ellis all competed in the 2022 Olympic Winter Games in Beijing. All 3 of these athletes have benefitted in some way from the RMOW grant in their careers. Having local Olympians as a legacy of 2010 is of huge benefit to the community.

After the closure of the Calgary track, Whistler now has the only track in Canada. Pre Covid, we hosted more athletes at our BCLA sanctioned races as result of this and this in turn gave our young athletes the chance to test themselves against new competitiors.

With the 2021 FIL Luge World Championships in Whistler being cancelled due to Covid, we in turn lost a huge opportunity to promote our sport. As soon as is possible, the FIL will re award the FIL World Championships to Whistler and we must be ready to react. Our athletes, volunteers and officials will all play a part, whether competing, officiating or promoting our sport. It is imperative that we take this opportunity with the most high profile luge event to come to Whistler since 2010.

Being Olympic year we are expecting an influx of interest and we must be ready to capitalise on this.

Our finances have taken a definite hit over the past 2 seasons and the RMOW grant is a huge help with our operations.



WMSC serves over 160 athletes between 10 and 20 years of age to reach their goals in ski racing. Our mission is to "Develop Champions in Life and in Sports". Our objective is to create and implement a program and strategies to improve our athletes physical activity, their health and nutrition education, support not only their physical but mental and emotional development in times were COVID-19 and social media have overtaking their lives.

- 1) Implementing sport strategies that will help athletes build mastery of skills to apply in their life, like: plan for success, how to face challenges and find solutions. We will address the mental aspect of ski racing with the goal of maximizing focus, awareness, mindfulnesses and performance for athletes and coaches.
- 2) Continue with the integration of our young athletes with the WB Ski school to simplify the pathway into and through programs and the sharing of gear and equipment to benefit the young ski community in Whistler outside of WMSC (Fridays and/or Saturdays skiing with WMSC and Whistler Kids Club; days Ski Up days for all keen skiers in the community to tryout ski racing, Nancy Greene Skills Event and Janyk Cup open to WB Ski School)
- 3) Implementing an outdoor multi-sport summer program to complement the strength and endurance required on the off-snow months to keep our athletes and coaches training locally.
- 4) Providing professional development for WMSC coaches and staff, full and part time, to deliver the above. We partner with Whistler Sport Legacies and ViaSport to host a coaching symposium for certification and professional development for alpine ski coaches to fulfill the National Coaching Certification Program

We have seen measurable results in our approach, the skills set we instill into our athletes has taken them to the next level; 2 of BC Alpine Team are WMSC athletes. BC Alpine Coach, Morgan Pridy, is a WMSC Alumni. 8 of the Canadian Alpine team are WMSC alumn and Coaches Mark Tilston, Nick Cooper and Conrad Pridy are from WMSC as well. We have recruited former athletes to Coach the young generations. These same skills are then put into other snow sports: Ski Cross, Down Hill, free style. And more rewarding to what we do, we are one of the few sports in the Resort Municipality of Whistler that produces Olympians!

Our proposal requests \$30,000 in funding to increase the level of staff training that we provide our coaches to equip the Whistler Mountain Ski Club with the knowledge to deliver the right skills to our athletes.

She is an essential asset to the club as she is the only coach in the Sea to Sky region with this certification. Her skills in coaching are needed to bring our athletes from the recreational level to the competitive levels. This is an annual, ongoing expense.
- (124.8km/day x 3days/week x \$0.46/km x 40weeks/season = \$6888.90/season)

The Whistler Chamber Music Society (WCMS) was formed in 2017 to plan and present 5 to 6 live classical music concerts a year in Whistler, enabling local music lovers opportunities to hear quality live classical music throughout the year without travelling to the city. The WCMS contracts accomplished professional classical musicians, playing in a variety of groups, with different instruments; for instance: guitar, piano, strings, brass, wind or voice ensembles, or combinations thereof, of between 2 and 12 musicians. Musicians are encouraged to play a wide selection of classical music, and to chat about their instruments, the pieces they are playing, and their musical lives, making a connection between listeners and performers that is sometimes lacking in classical music concerts. Concerts are held on Sundays, 5pm-6:15pm with no intermission, to allow audience members to attend after daytime activities, and go out to dine in the village or go home for dinner afterwards. The WCMS has found these concerts to be highly appealing to Whistler audiences, and it is gratifying to see concerts well-attended, with many familiar faces, including many of our older residents, in the crowd. The WCMS successfully presented 20 concerts over four years, 2017-2020.

Like all live music organizations, the WCMS concerts came to an abrupt halt in early 2020 because of Covid-19. Our last concert was held in March 2020. Sadly, concerts for April 2020 (featuring Touch of Brass), as well as all booked concerts for October, November, and December 2020 plus March and April 2021, had to be cancelled. The WCMS has been on hiatus ever since, waiting for circumstances to change to allow live music once more to be performed for a sizeable audience, keeping in mind than many of our audience members are older and more cautious due to increased vulnerability.

The WCMS has decided that the time has come to once more offer live classical music in Whistler. Performers are very keen to play again for audiences, listeners are looking to once more enjoy live music, and the WCMS is eager to offer these opportunities.

The WCMS will hold its first concert on March 20, 2022, featuring the Canadian Guitar Quartet, on tour from Montreal, followed by the Dulu Quintet from Vancouver (piano, clarinet, oboe, bassoon and French horn) on May 15th. The WCMS is currently negotiating with performers for concerts in October and November 2022 (the Koerner Trio and piano duet) and has confirmed a 12-member chamber orchestra for a concert in late 2022.

**The WCMS is applying for the CEP grant of \$2,000 to apply to performer fees for 2022. The WCMS hires accomplished professional musicians, and believes that performers should be fairly paid. This guarantees a quality music experience for Whistler audiences. Performers fees are the largest expense for the WCMS.

As a result of the hiatus, the WCMS does not have a meaningful financial statement for 2021. On the advice of Laura Dendel, CEP Administrator, the WCMS is submitting a proposed budget for 2022.

The WCMS is happy to provide any further financial information if requested.

Covid-19 has presented many challenges to both local community organizations and businesses as the Public Health Orders have changed over the past two years. This has acutely affected the WCMS, as with all performing arts presenters, whether it is dance, theatre or live music. 


Sunday October 6th Cascadia Reed Quintet



This grant would help pay the wages of the facilitator of this program. The plan for the year is to offer a 2.5 hour playgroup three times a week (Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday) for nine months a year and for the warm summer months to offer playgroup outdoors in one of the local parks once a week. This would equate to close to 400 hundred hours of playgroup time for Whistler families with young children.

The Whistler Playgroup is not a new activity but it has changed and developed from what it has been in the past. It is now called the CCRR Whistler Playgroup (formally known as The Whistler Parent-tot Program), CCRR (Child Care Resource and Referral) is a provincial program that The Child Care Resource and Referral Program (CCRR) is here to help all parents/guardians and childcare providers in the Corridor. We are making an effort to have a bigger presence in Whistler to offer our services to families.

Playgroups provide parents with an opportunity to learn from one another, to improve their parenting skills and knowledge about their children's needs, and to develop a strong social support network that they can draw on for emotional and practical support when needed. It really is the modern day 'village'. Children who attend playgroups during early childhood have significantly better child development when they start school. The benefits of playgroup are seen across all domains of child development: physical, social, emotional, language and cognitive development, and communication. This why these programs are so important. But, very briefly:

Early childhood experiences profoundly affect later health, education, and employment outcomes.

There is a "window of opportunity" from 0 to 6 when we can get children on a trajectory towards health, education, and employment.

Adverse experiences, like low income, poverty, neglect, and food insecurity, cause developmental delays in children and lead to poor future outcomes. The biggest determining factors on a child's early experiences are their parents or primary caregivers. Many Canadian parents don't have the skills, resources, or knowledge they need to provide those nurturing early experiences. This is an upstream program that reduces the need for more expensive interventions. The purpose of this grant is to support the operation of a playgroup in Whistler for families of young children.

Canadian children have increasingly delayed development. One measure of child development is the Early Development Instrument (EDI). The instrument measures five core areas of early child development that are known to be good predictors of adult health, education, and social outcomes. Recent figures estimate that the 28% of Canadian children are vulnerable in one or more areas of development when tested in Kindergarten (CIHI, 2022), up from 26% in 2014 (CIHI, 2014). In BC, rates of vulnerability are higher with 34.6% of children starting school with vulnerabilities in one or more areas that are critical to their health—and that trend is increasing (HEPL, 2016).

Many children are also facing adverse childhood events that we know lead to developmental delays and poor health. Nearly one in five Canadian children live in poverty (First Call, 2021), with food bank usage—even before the pandemic—in some parts of the country at its all-time highest with a disproportionate number of users being children (Ghoussoub, 2016). One in three Canadian children experiences physical abuse, sexual abuse, exposure to intimate violence, or a combination of these (Boesveld, 2014). The rates of neglect are likely even higher than that (Trocmé, 2005).

Child Care Resource and referral (CCRR) through playgroups responds to these issues and others by supporting the most vulnerable families to provide the best environments for their children. Through role modeling and referrals to other services and resources, these playgroups can create a place that families get the guidance and help they need.

Better at Home services vary from community to community, designed to fit the unique needs of local seniors. In Whistler our priority has been light housekeeping, valuable to our clients who cannot afford the cleaning costs that are unaffordable to those on a lower income. The cost for them is based on a sliding scale determined by their income.

Our cleaning contractor attends several homes to provide this service as well as being an appreciated visitor/connection for those who are not able to get out and about in the community themselves. Especially during the Winter and during the pandemic.

Our Coordinator continues to reach out into the Community to those who may be in need of our services as well as finding new volunteers. The pandemic has continued to make programming challenging, offering in person presentations or workshops is part of what we do but up to now has not been available. It is important that we start to build that back into our service. It is a great way to bring our program to the attention of residents as well - for both potential clients and their families and for potential volunteers. With the main office at SSCS in Squamish it is important that we make the journey to Whistler to connect with Service Providers and residents.

Funding will also be available to provide both local and Corridor wide transportation to clients who need help from volunteers in attending medical appointments. Transportation in the Corridor as well as a lack of a Handidart bus in Whistler leaves seniors in a difficult situation when it comes to getting out and about.

1. \$1,000.00 for Junior Coaching Program Expenses

We would like to resurrect our Junior Coaching Program, which we had to suspend due to COVID restrictions. This program gives swim club athletes (ages 14-16) the opportunity to learn coaching skills under the close supervision of our two Head Coaches and earn an hourly wage while doing so. The Junior Coaches learn valuable lessons about responsibility, respect and responsiveness, which they will carry into their adult lives. Ultimately, the Junior Coaches will have the opportunity to mentor younger swimmers on their own, and the Club will have a pipeline of experienced candidates from which to recruit Assistant Swim Coaches.

2. \$1,000.00 for Swim Meet Apparatus Costs

The team is in need of a high-quality, competition-approved False-Start System which will positively augment our ability to host successful swim meets in Whistler. This new system will enable the fast release of a recall line, quickly blocking all pool lanes and making swimmers aware of a false start. Up to this point we have been using what equates to a homemade clothesline and donut-style weight system, and it is no longer sufficient for our competitive needs.

3. \$1,000.00 for an On-Deck Training Equipment Storage Unit We are looking to purchase a large and secure waterproof unit to store our teams' kickboards, pull-buoys and swim fins on the pool deck at Meadow Park. It would replace our current dilapidated Rubber Maid cabinet that was donated over 10 years ago. The total cost would be approximately \$4,000.00 (including taxes and delivery), with \$3,000.00 of the purchase price being paid for out of our Swim-A-Thon Fundraiser monies.

After a year and a half of strict social distancing in the pool and on the pool deck, the kids in our program were thrilled to return to our regular sociable team training environment in Fall 2021. Their enthusiasm resulted in a record-breaking fundraising total for our annual Swim-A-Thon. The kids raised an amazing \$19,000, smashing our previous record from 2019 by over \$10,000. Despite the early start for our younger swimmers (6 am on a cold Saturday in November), we had 62 participants aged from 7 to 16 and they swam 10,952 laps in a two-hour period. Collectively, the kids swam 275 km, with one swimmer covering 8.3 km!

It is this enthusiasm that encourages local residents—be it neighbors, friends, teachers, parents and the like—to support our team year after year. The funds raised will be used primarily to maintain our fees at the current rates, as well as for new training supplies, multiple intra-squad meets and social events throughout the year, and a new multi-lane electronic timing scoreboard.

Furthermore, being an indoor sport in a temperature-controlled environment without weather dependencies, swim training can take place year-round, further enriching community life.





Our Counseling Assistance Program has been set up to assist financially restricted individuals and couples who could benefit from clinical mental and emotional counseling and to learn skills to better manage their mental health and become more resilient. Residents who meet the financial criteria can access a subsidy up to \$70/hour towards 6 hours of counseling. An Outreach worker will review the list of qualified counselors or psychologists with community members to find the best match.

Depending on the client's financial situation, WCSS will subsidize a certain amount. Average visit will cost the client \$35-\$50 after the subsidy. After meeting with an outreach worker and making sure the financial & residential criteria are met, the community member is approved for 6 sessions in that same year.

Budgeted costs for this program consist of Clinical Counselors' fees that WCSS subsidizes. With the current and ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the need for counseling assistance remains at the highest demand we have ever seen. The stress and anxiety of the pandemic, compounded with lack of safe and affordable housing along with insecure financial status due to extreme housing costs in Whistler has left many residents feeling the need to seek professional help, in a time of their lies when extra money is not available to them. Additionally many employers lack solid employee assistance programs to help with counseling services. By removing the financial barrier to accessing counseling, we can continue to support and advocate for a healthy community. Currently Vancouver Coastal Health services are at a 4-6 month wait and with the ongoing pandemic this is not expected to change quickly.

No, Counselling Assistance has been a program for many years.

In the calendar year of 2021, WCSS outreach team met with clients a total of 6,128 times, of which 1,644 were first time visits with new clients. Of those clients, on average 26% self identified with being in a state of crisis. The average age of clients are in their 30's which represented 2,598 people in 2021. The primary reasons for people to access our services were emotional support, then financial aid and mental health challenges. Our number one referral for both emotional and mental health is the Counselling assistance program to allow clients access to clinical Counsellors. A total of 135 applications from clients were processed for Counselling Assistance in 2021. It is expected that 2022 will see slightly elevated demand.

Outreach Workers work closely with community members who face challenges with mental health, financial insecurity, advocacy, physical health and injury, housing, food insecurity, substance use, employment, family/friend relationships, or violence/conflict in relationships. While our outreach workers are well trained and educated sometimes the challenge a client is facing requires professional assistance beyond what our outreach workers are trained for and thus require the specialized services of a certified clinical counselor. Although we have great resources through Vancouver Coastal Health, the average wait time for a person to see a clinical counselor can currently be anywhere between 4-6 months.

For years, wannabe goalies have been restricted by the inherent challenges of dressing for the position. After all, there's a lot of gear to put on, and for younger players, getting properly outfitted takes time and a team effort.

It also is a huge investment financially for a family, if a child is just 'trying out' this position. WMHA would like to purchase new goalie equipment for our younger age group. This goalie equipment is specifically designed to make it easy for a coach or parent to convert a skater into a goalie. Within one minute, you can have your skater ready to play between the pipes. It is designed to fit over standard player equipment, which makes it easy for the transition. This means more children will be able to rotate thru this position and see if they want to continue playing net. The more children who experience 'saving pucks', the more goalies Whistler Minor Hockey may attract, and the better the association will be.

This new equipment would be in conjunction with goalie development. We would provide goalie training to these young athletes at no additional cost. 



The Whistler Waldorf School respectfully requests \$3439.35 to support the purchase of requisite outdoor education equipment intended to help enhance our Outdoor Education program. The primary goal of the WWS Outdoor Education Program is to provide all students with physically, emotionally and socially challenging wilderness experiences. Students participate in a variety of outdoor ed experiences including hiking, camping, paddling, surfing and climbing. The technical skills developed over the course of high school are extensive: camping on challenging surfaces, cooking varied meals with limited tools, canoeing and water rescue skills, assessment of terrain and avalanche danger, weather awareness, bear safety and map reading. First aid in the backcountry, travelling safely on rocky and steep slopes, and creek crossing skills are also studied and practised. In addition to technical skills, students develop soft skills including responsibility, independence, self-discipline, interpersonal skills, courage and leadership.

Outdoor education at Whistler Waldorf integrates its academic curriculum into the outdoors. Outdoor classrooms are created in the field and whether it is a botany, geography, astronomy or First Nations history lesson, it is fully experienced by the students. In all lessons, students are encouraged to engage and actively reflect on their roles as stewards of our environment. The WWS Outdoor Education Program is robust and we believe impactful on the adults our students will later become.

At present, we lack enough outdoor ed equipment to accommodate all of our students and often rely on parents to loan the school the required equipment necessary to offer these experiences. Working with families' disparate gear is problematic. It can enable discrepancies in students 'experiences and pose challenges to ensuring that all gear used by our students adheres to the same technical and safety standards.

Our objective is to own class sets of equipment including tents, stoves, stove accessories, tarps, inReach safety devices, snowshoes, and backpacks. Funds for these projects are currently unavailable in our operating budget. As outlined, much of our operating budget is allocated to faculty salaries as we strive to offer a living salary concurrent with Public School salaries. As well, our extensive Tuition Adjustment program allows for accessibility by all families regardless of socio-economic status which is key to our values and allows our student population to be a true reflection of the community. Over 25% of families at WWS (30% students) are granted adjusted tuition rates.

WWS is a not-for-profit organization that has been a part of the Whistler community for 22 years. In addition to being an Ministry of Education accredited independent school, we are in good standing with the Ministry of Children and Family Development and currently hold two Group Childcare licenses to offer childminding to children aged 30 months to school age.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

WWS provides the community with a financially accessible, experiential and arts based education. Having school choice in Whistler is something that helps students, families and the school system as a whole. While the public system offers a great option for many families, children are unique and a single system might not be optimal for everyone. School choice underpins pluralism in society and allows families to choose a school to best meet the needs of their child and values within the frame of common social values. 42% of our students scored 4 (extending) on the ministry literacy exam compared to 14% province wide and 14% scored extending on the math exam compared to 5% province wide. 100% of our Grade 12 students graduated with honours distinction on their Dogwood diploma. We were also awared the 2021 BC Childcare Award of Excellence Honourable Mention.

We fundraise annually. We raised \$60,000 through our school's Annual Give to help support faculty professional development, facilities upgrades, and diversity, equity and inclusion training for teachers. We were the grateful recipient of a grant from Whistler Blackcomb Foundation in 2021 to be used to purchase science equipment for our middle & high school classes and maker space (moveable) tables.

We do have continued need for capital purchases for our licensed childcare program (notably a play structure replacement is required at our Spruce Grove location), but we hope to secure funding for that through the Childcare BC Maintenance Fund.

The Whistler Lakes Conservation Association (WLCA) is in year 2 of its Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program (VLMP) in five Whistler lakes (Alpha, Nita, Alta, Green and Lost). This year WLCA is expanding its monitoring to a more comprehensive program and is requesting a grant of \$5,420 from the Community Enrichment Program (CEP) towards the purchase of 4 dissolved oxygen meters for use on the lakes. Dissolved oxygen is an important indicator of water quality.

Increasingly, community concerns are growing about the impact of human activity in and around our lakes. The goal of the program is to improve and share knowledge to understand, protect and sustain Whistler lakes. Each year the VLMP monitoring season starts in early April and runs to mid-October. The program has eleven dedicated volunteers, including one program coordinator and ten lake monitors. Sampling trips on each lake are done weekly and take up to 2-3 hours. The data collected is uploaded to the BC Ministry of Environment's (ENV) provincial data base every year and lake quality trends are reported every 3 years. WLCA reports annually on the program's progress.

In 2021, WLCA purchased equipment to measure lake clarity and temperature for all 5 lakes. Also, the program was enhanced on Alta Lake by adding in dissolved oxygen (DO) and temperature profiles with the purchase of one DO meter.

From 2022 and onward, the more comprehensive program requires a greater volunteer time commitment on the lakes. Securing dedicated DO meters for each lake will boost monitoring capacity and help volunteers maintain efficient field operations. As part of WLCA's long-term monitoring plan, the purchase of this equipment will improve our understanding of lake chemistry and biology and inform public education, stewardship activities and management actions. With climate warming, it is becoming increasingly important to document dissolved oxygen and temperature profiles for lakes.

It's been 9-12 years since all the Whistler lakes have been routinely sampled so those historical records will provide a good baseline to compare to present day water quality. A 3-year period of record is required to build on that baseline and detect changes to facilitate long-term lake management. The VLMP data collected will supplement, not duplicate, the data already collected by the Resort Municipality of Whistler (RMOW) and Ministry of Environment. Government agencies simply do not have the resources to routinely sample every lake in the province and, thus, embrace the value of lake stewardship groups like WLCA and others around the province.

The WLCA VLMP was established in 2021 and its mission is to develop, with partners, a robust monitoring and reporting program that contributes to the long-term health and enjoyment of Whistler Lakes. Short, medium and long term targets include:

- Purchase 4 additional DO meters to collect dissolved oxygen and temperature profiles for all 5 Whistler Lakes, starting in 2022;
- Report annually on program progress and in 2023 water quality reports for each of the 5 Whistler Lakes;
- Conduct ongoing review of data to inform future stewardship and management actions (e.g. habitat restoration, reduced erosion, environmentally sensitive construction in/around lakes and foreshore).
- Establish Report Cards for each lake, track performance indicators and take appropriate actions to ensure long term health and sustainability of Whistler lakes.

CEP Grant Request

The CEP grant request of \$5,420 is for monitoring equipment to be used in WLCA's long term monitoring program to improve our understanding of lake chemistry and biology and inform public education, stewardship activities and management actions. This up-front investment will contribute to the long-term health and enjoyment of Whistler lakes.

Direct Contribution by WLCA and VLMP Volunteers

The WLCA will directly contribute 558 to 948 volunteer hours / year to the VLMP program from 2022 and ongoing. The program has eleven dedicated volunteers. This includes one program coordinator and 10 lake monitors. Five lakes are sampled every week from mid-April to mid- October. Each weekly sampling trip under the expanded DO/T program is approximately 2-3 hours.

Other Partners

WLCA Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program works in partnership with the <u>BC Lake Stewardship Society</u> (BCLSS), the <u>Resort Municipality of Whistler</u> (RMOW) and the <u>BC Ministry of Environment & Climate Change</u> (ENV). BCLSS provides WLCA with training, limited equipment, technical support, data management, funding for laboratory analyses and Quality Assurance/Quality Control audits. RMOW provides technical advice and has placed buoys in the lakes to mark sampling locations. ENV provides technical advice and data analytical and report writing services.

Implications of CEP not providing funding

If this application for 2022 CEP funding is not approved, the full implementation of this season's monitoring program will be deferred. The opportunity to collect dissolved oxygen (DO) data on all lakes will be missed and the 3-year reports in 2023 will not include DO trends. Other opportunities for funding partners will be pursued as application windows open.

We can't manage what we don't measure. The work of our Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program (VLMP), its dedicated team of volunteers and the acquisition of monitoring equipment from this CEP grant request present a real opportunity to improve several performance indicators (CPIs) in Whistler's five priority areas in the coming years:

- 1. Enriching Community Life -The data collected by the Whistler Lakes VLMP supplements and is integrated with water data already collected and reported by RMOW and the Province. This coordinated effort allows us to focus on areas of our lakes that need attention. We want the issues on our lakes to be well understood and effectively managed because not doing so may degrade the local environment, affect the livability of our region, compromise Whistler's economy, and even directly impact our personal health.
- 2. Enhancing the Resort Experience In recent years, residents and visitors have noticed changes in the environment of Whistler Lakes including noise, pollution, shoreline erosion, poor boating practices, improper dock construction, and the dumping of koi and goldfish. These changes also negatively impact the lake experience and visitor satisfaction and numbers. A CEP grant will bolster the VLMP's monitoring capacity, ability to observe trends over time and, with our partners, take appropriate preventative or remedial actions to safeguard our lakes. CPIs related to visitor satisfaction and atmosphere should improve.

3. **Protecting the Environment** – WLCA has several outreach activities planned for 2022-23 that will help Whistler attain its goal for "residents to understand the importance of the natural environment" including distributing a *How Healthy is My Shoreline Quiz* and *Waterfront Living* – *The Benefits of Shoreline Care* to all lakeshore residents. Also, the BC Lake Stewardship Society will deliver its LakeKeepers Workshop in Whistler to help us gain a greater understanding of lake ecology and management and increase our local capacity to take care of Whistler lakes.

Enhanced monitoring of dissolved oxygen (DO) and temperature with the purchase of 4 DO meters will give us more insight into the health of our five lakes and inform us where we need to protect sensitive areas and restore areas in the community that have been negatively affected by human activity. This includes "thinking like a watershed" and knowing that what happens on the land affects our water. With this mindset, we can ensure that new land development proceeds in a manner that minimizes impact to our water resources and environment. Improvements in CPIs related to developed footprint and water quality and use should improve.

- 4. **Ensuring Economic Viability** WLCA's aim, with our partners, is to expand freshwater knowledge in Whistler through coordinated and credible community-based monitoring and reporting. A CEP investment of \$5,420 to WLCA's monitoring effort can only complement the resort community's priorities regarding tourism and leading the way in its move toward economic and environmental sustainability.
- 5. Partnering for Success The weekly presence of VLMP volunteers out on the lakes from April to October stirs curiosity from bystanders. By explaining to people what we are doing and why helps them understand the connections between human activities, lakes and watersheds. This builds a stewardship ethic. Our hope is that our actions inspire more people in the community to connect to nature and take responsibility on a personal level for lake stewardship. When people get passionate, involved and better informed they are more likely to provide input to and have more trust in decision-making.



Planning & Priorities 2021-23 November 1, 2021

In the last decade many local lakeside residents have noticed changes in the environment of Whistler lakes. Increasingly, we are concerned about the impact of human activity on, in and around the lakes, including improper land development, dock construction, excessive nutrients from fertilized lawns and poor boating practices. Also, it's been over 10 years since all the Whistler lakes have been routinely monitored so there is insufficient data to fully understand the health of the lakes or track changes over time.

More details on issues needing attention are documented on the <u>WLCA</u> <u>website</u>. Although each lake has its unique challenges, a number of issues are common to all five lakes (i.e. Alpha, Nita, Alta, Green and Lost).

AREAS OF FOCUS

The WLCA Board of Directors has reviewed the priority issues and concerns that WLCA members have identified and continue to bring forward. In setting priorities for 2021-23 the Board has determined the Association's work over the next two years will focus on the following three areas:

WATER QUALITY WATER USE WATERSHED HEALTH

Goals and actions in each of these areas are outlined below. These are not arranged by priority and related specific tasks or projects under each action will proceed on a realistic timeline based on available resources.

GOALS AND ACTIONS

GOAL 1. WATER QUALITY – Ensure Whistler lakes are healthy and sustainable.

Accomplishments to date:

- o Participated in annual lake clean ups.
- Established and implemented year 1 of a Level 1 Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program on 5 Whistler lakes in partnership with BCLSS, RMOW, ENV, WBFEF (see full names of organizations on pg. 2).
- o Established a relationship with the Squamish Lil' Wat Cultural Centre to gather history about original names for places in the area.

ACTIONS FOR 2021-23:

- Monitoring and reporting
 - Expand VLMP to Level 3, adding water chemistry and dissolved oxygen as important indicators of lake health.
 - o In 2023, report out on water quality findings; determine future stewardship and monitoring actions (e.g. stream water chemistry and riparian area assessments).



PARC is applying for CEP funding for three areas of its programming in 2022. Sunday Concert Ser ies (\$4000); PARC Grant Writing Program (\$2000); and PARC General Operations (\$2000).

PARC evolved much of its programming in 2021 to accommodate Covid restrictions. One of these programs was the Sunday Concert Series (formerly Sundays at The Point) switching to ticketed e vents with live music under the lakeside tent for Covid safe outdoor gatherings. The six week serie s proved successful and PARC will expand to eight weeks in 2022. Funds will be used to pay musi cians, audio visual technicians and kitchen staff. (Requesting \$4000)

PARC's grant writing program continues to grow and bear fruit in sourcing funding both within an d outside the Whistler community. In 2021 the grant writing program applied to Canada Summer J obs, BC Arts Council, Whistler Community Foundation, Whistler Blackcomb Foundation, and the R MOW's Community Enrichment Program generating a total of \$37,000. (Requesting \$2000)

Covid restrictions in 2020 led to a severe drop in revenue for PARC due to the inability to host tic keted indoor events. PARC's annual revenue went from \$93,000 in 2019/20 to \$48,000 in 2020/21. With innovations in programming and less restrictions in summer 2021, PARC rebuilt its operating budget in 2021/22 to approximately \$80,000. The total projected budget for 2022/2023 is \$140,00 0 pending a number of grant applications. With this projected growth, PARC is seeking funding for growing administrative costs for bookkeeping and other office expenses. (Requesting \$2000).

PARC's total request for CEP funding in 2022 is \$8,000.

These programs have been in existence for 11 years.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

PARC continued to evolve its programming in 2021 to deliver performances, festivals, camps and artist work space, and to rebuild it s financial base. Children's 5 day theatre, music and art camps were well subscribed with capacity pushed up to 10 campers to accommodate demand (6 camps). Pivoting Sundays at the Point to the Sunday Concert Series with ticketed events under the lakeside tent proved a positive new format that is Covid safe, allowed for the anticipation of numbers of attendees in advance and drove greater revenue while hiring more artists. This format will be continued moving forward. Drop in Sunday Artist Sessions provided safe space for artists to work on projects, some of which funnelled into the Sunday Concert Series. The 10th Annual Flag Stop Theatre & Arts Festival was a highlight of the year with three theatre companies participating, including over 20 actors and 40 artists in total. Both evenings of performances were sold out. An additional one time Arts and Culture Resilience Supplement grant from BC Arts Council enabled PARC to get back on its feet financially and to purchase video and live streaming equipment to produce shows regardless of changing Covid restrictions. PARC's operating budget returned to approximately 85 percent of pre-Covid levels.

As in past years, PARC is applying for funding in 2022 from Canada Summer Jobs (\$5000), BC Ar ts Council Community Festivals grant (\$5000), Whistler Community Foundation (\$6500) and CEP (\$8000). PARC is again requesting a \$10,000 investment from the RMOW's Cultural Planning Depa rtment for its Learning & Education programming, and will be applying to the FE&A Department for \$15,000 to match the Government of BC's BCFFE grant for the expanded 11th Annual Flag Stop Theatre & Arts Festival. In addition, PARC has applied this year for BC Arts Council's Arts Impact grant for \$30,000 to assist with Artistic Director fees and other administrative expenses. PARC wa s awarded \$15,000 from the Government of BC's Fairs Festivals & Events Recovery Fund which w ill enable it to expand the Flag Stop Festival to five days, making use of other outdoor venues in the e valley as well as The Point. PARC received a \$2000 grant from Whistler Blackcomb Foundation i n 2021 allowing it to purchase stage lighting with matching funds form BC Arts Council's Resilience grant. The one time resilience grant also enabled PARC to raise the Artistic Director's fee after red ucing it in 2020 due to Covid restrictions. A Pivot grant from BC Arts Council for purchasing technic al equipment was rejected in 2021, but other grants helped to move forward with purchasing video, live streaming and stage lighting equipment. PARC's annual fundraiser switched to an online Go F und Me campaign in 2020/21, but plans are underway to return to an in person fundraising event a t The Point in May or June 2022.







The Axemen Rugby Club is a volunteer run club that serves the Sea to Sky corridor rugby community. The club provides the only opportunity to play rugby within the area and attracts players between North Vancouver and as far north as Pemberton.

The senior men's team was founded in 2014 and has built from 20 participants playing in BC Division 3 to over 60 registered members playing competitive rugby in BC Division 2 as well as frequently fielding a 2nd XV that compete in BC Division 3.

The club is composed largely of people that have moved to Whistler or Squamish from different countries or different areas of Canada. It provides a community, a support system and a 'home away from home' for all its members. The club is inclusive of all abilities and welcomes everyone to join the club.

The purpose of this grant is to start a program in which the Axemen club coach will lead rugby sessions for u-16 and u-18 age groups within Whistler.

The club currently has only 2 registered players that are originally from Whistler. The club aims to build its number of 'homegrown' players and introducing coaching at u-16 and u-18 is the key building block in this pathway. A rugby program at this age opens future opportunities for playing university sport, provides key social connections and promotes the world rugby values of discipline, respect, integrity, passion and solidarity.

The Axemen Rugby Club are applying for a \$2500 grant to introduce a rugby program at Whistler Secondary School for the fall of 2022. The club would like to run a 6-session program for u-16 boys, u-18 boys and u-16/18 combined girls. The program will conclude with a match against another school.

The coaching costs for the program are calculated at \$1,575. Coaching fees are set at \$75 per session/game and 21 separate coaching sessions are being included within the grant (6 coaching sessions + 1 game day for 3 separate age groups).

Equipment costs of \$625 will provide the program with 8 rugby balls (four size 4 and four size 5 balls), 2 new tackle shields and 2 new protective tackle suits, as well as, a set of new training bibs. As it is a new program the equipment costs are higher for this first year and would be reduced in following applications.

The grant also includes \$300 for additional coaching costs such as police checks, continued coach education and a rugby referee course to help facilitate games at the end of the program.

The initial target of the program is to have over 12 participants attend the 6 training sessions for each group (u-16 boys, u-18 boys and girls). The program then aims to field teams in a structured 7 or 10 a side match at the end of the program. A long-term goal of the program is to have local home-grown players represent the Axemen Rugby Club senior teams.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

In the 2021-22 season the Axemen club successfully relaunched 2 teams after an 18 month break due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Keeping so many players actively involved and interested in the club was a great challenge, but the pandemic taught us that the strength of building a community team is what members value most!

In November of 2021 the club chairman, Blake Mahovic ran a Suicide Prevention Awareness course for members of the club. This event linked with the Men's Mental Health initiatives that the club take part in.

The Axemen Club are closely linked with Squamish Youth Rugby, and players have taken on volunteer coaching roles with the youth teams. A community touch rugby session has been a huge success, playing drop in touch before home games on Saturdays and every Tuesday evenings.

This is the first year that the Axemen Rugby Club has applied for funding to promote the club, and the game of rugby, within the community. In January of 2022 we were successfully awarded a \$5000 grant from HSBC Rugby Canada to develop a 'Connect to Club' program. This funding will allow us to go into schools, youth groups and summer camps throughout the Sea to Sky. The funding allows the club to run 'Introduction to Rugby Sessions' for up to 500 children between the ages of 7 and 16.

The HSBC funding is aimed at increasing awareness and getting people interested in rugby. This current bid will get youth involved in the game, increase their rugby skills and promote future rugby pathways.

No bids have been rejected to date.



The PEACE (Prevention, Education, Advocacy, Counselling, and Empowerment) Program offers support and counselling services to children, youth and their families in Whistler and Pemberton who are experiencing conflict through abuse/violence in relationships and/or conflict through separation and divorce. The HSWC receives funding for 17.5 staff hours a week from the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General for both communities. The program has been operating at 31 hours per week which includes 7.5 hours funded by community donations and 6 hours funded by the RMOW. With increased funds from the Community Enrichment Grant, HSWC intend to increase the PEACE counselling hours to 35 hours per week in order to meet increased demand and mitigate the waitlist to effectively meet the growing needs of the children, youth and families within Whistler and Pemberton.

Through the PEACE program, children and youth learn how to identify hard to handle feelings and how to express them in healthy ways, recognize their strengths, and increase their self-confidence and self-esteem. They learn effective problem solving and coping skills, how to define and protect boundaries, how to keep themselves safe and to identify safe and supportive people in their life, and better understand the concept of healthy relationships. Most importantly, children are provided with a safe, supportive, nurturing environment to deal with traumatic events in their lives and learn that they are not alone and not at fault for the conflict/abuse they have witnessed and experienced. By offering free, low barrier, non-judgmental, confidential support to all survivors in the community, the HSWC programs and services supports Whistler residents in continuing to engage fully in the economic, social, cultural, and recreational opportunities that make Whistler the vibrant community that it is. HSWC violence prevention efforts also contribute to long-term savings in community safety, crime prevention, and healthcare costs.

3. Partnering for success

Working collaboratively in partnership with other agencies, law enforcement, and the justice system is paramount to realizing the HSWC vision of a violence free future. With that in mind, WWC actively participates in cross-sectoral committees and partner relationships focused on ending gender-based violence, including RCMP, Victim Services, Ending Violence Association of BC, BC Society of Transition Houses, Sea to Sky Community Services, Mental Health and Addiction, the Ministry of Children and Family Development, and the Whistler Non-Profit Network. Specifically, within the PEACE program, the counsellors partner with schools and other organizations within Whistler to be able to effectively support more children and youth through support groups.

MESSAGE

FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT, JO-ANNA GORTON

Each year the Howe Sound Women's Centre provides safety, support, and programming to thousands of individuals in the Sea-to-Sky Corridor. 2020 brought unprecedented challenges to the communities we serve and with that, increased demand for our services. I couldn't be prouder of the staff at the HSWC who worked tirelessly throughout the year to ensure our safe housing, programs, drop-in centres, and social enterprise could adapt quickly and meet the communities' needs

This was not only in the context of the pandemic, but also in a transition to a temporary dropin centre while our Third Avenue property in Squamish undergoes a redevelopment to support our growing organization. A silver lining throughout this pandemic year was the increased profile of the organization, both across the corridor and provincially. With that has come recognition and incredible support

from the community, allowing us to embark on initiatives that have been in the wings for years and the ability to strengthen existing programs simultaneously. A read through this report will give you a sense of the scale and breadth of this impressive organization; we have so much to be proud of and to look forward to as an organization. Thanks again to everyone for their hard work.





FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ASHLEY OAKES

I struggle to find the words to paint the picture of this past year. The metaphors are endless - a rollercoaster, a hurricane, a rollercane, a hurricoaster...

the truth is it was like nothing any of us has ever experienced and yet we were all in it together Different boats; same storm. The world over, Covid-19 dominated our work, the work of communities, provinces, nations, countries, continents, and it would be impossible for me to tell the story of this year without framing t within the lens of the pandemic.

When HSWC's fiscal year started on April 1, 2020, we were facing the unknown. Pearl's Value & Vintage, a source of 40% of the society's operating revenue and location of 25% of the organization's staff, was closed indefinitely The Squamish and Whistler Drop-In Centres, PEACE Counsellors, and Outreach Support Workers were providing crisis support virtually or outdoors. Finally, Pearl's Place Transit on House and Pearl's Safe Home staff were creating best practices to continue to house surv vors and their children fleeing violence in a way that was safe for all It was a time of incredible uncertainty; however, one thing was absolutely certain - survivors needed us more than ever It became clear early on that this pandemic was going to create a climate where violence rates would increase. Isolation, economic stress, anxiety, and fear combined with limited access to resources due to closures. HSWC immediately put in place additional methods to reach crisis support staff including adding a text line and crisis email to support those who could not call safely from their homes. Additionally, with the support of BC Housing and Whistler Blackcomb Foundation, we added hotel accommodations to our emergency housing supply that could be used for those experiencing symptoms of Covid 19 as well as for overflow.

When reflecting on this past year the word that continues to come to my mind is resilience. The amount of resilience displayed by survivors of volence is nothing short of awe inspiring. Additionally, resiliency was demonstrated daily by HSWC's staff, volunteers, and board who came ogether to ensure the needs of survivors were met no matter the circumstances. Not only did the team come together to

support survivors, but also to achieve several incredible goals laid out in HSWC's strategic plan.

This past year, construction began on a massive renovation of HSWC's Squamish Drop-In Centre - home to Squamish-based crisis support services including drop-in support, PEACE counselling, sexual assault response, and multicultural outreach, as well as the HSWC's administrative headquarters. Once the renovation is complete, in August 2021, the Squamish Drop-In Centre will have nearly doubled its capacity to meet the needs of survivors. This project would not have been possible without the incredible support of Whistler Blackcomb Foundation, the Katz Amsterdam Charitable Trust, and hundreds of local donors. We are thrilled to invite you to see the space once it's complete.

As we put 2020/2021 behind us, we set our focus on the coming year We know that the impact of the pandemic on survivors of violence will be felt for years to come The rates of family violence, high conflict divorce and separation, and mental health needs following a return to "normal" will remain high. In the coming year HSWC will launch the TRAVERSE - Sexual Assault Response Team program. This initiative will make available trained, crisis support workers 24/7 to respond to survivors of sexual violence and human trafficking. Additionally, we will launch a counselling subsidy program in order to remove the barrier of cost to accessing clinical counselling services for survivors of violence, focus on establishing more affordable housing options for survivors throughout the Sea to Sky Corridor, and begin a rebranding process to ensure our services are inclusive to all survivors of gender-based violence

To our donors - we would not be here in this capacity without you. The support shown by the community in the past year has been nothing short of incredible. Thank you doesn't feel like it is enough. You are a part of this society; woven in to the work we do; connected to the positive outcomes; a shoulder to lean on and cry; the foundation in our new building in the pages of books read to children in the PEACE program; in a meal served in the kitchen at the transition house. We raise our hands to you bursting with gratitude for your generosity.

HOUSING

PEARL'S PLACE TRANSITION HOUSE

The Transition House operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week providing temporary emergency housing and basic necessities, crisis support, advocacy, referrals, and help with form completion and housing searches for women and children fleeing domestic violence or at risk of violence.



To reduce barriers for people fleeing unsafe living conditions, PPTH operates as a medium barrier facility. This means the house accepts individuals who may be living with challenges related to substance use or mental illness and are capable of living safely in a communal environment. PPTH understands many people identify their pets as being members of their family, as such they are allowed to bring their pets with them.

PPTH is grateful to BC Housing and the Sandman Hotel in Squamish for providing temporary expansion space during the Covid-19 pandemic. This has meant, for those individuals who contacted during the days the Transition House was at capacity, there was another option available to allow people fleeing violence to remain within their community.

During the 2020/2021 fiscal year, the Transition House provided phone support to 222 individuals. In that same time period, emergency shelter services were offered through the Transition House or expansion site to 57 adults for a total of 947 bed nights and 23 children for a total of 315 bed nights. Additionally, the Transition House was at capacity for 127 days.

The past year has been a time of unpredictability. During times when people were being advised to stay home to be safe, some people were forced to flee their homes. They took the risk of reaching out and trusting strangers to provide them safety from the dangers within their own homes, and the risks associated with the Covid-19 pandemic. Transition House staff met challenges associated with working through a pandemic head on and stepped forward showing they were worthy of the trust placed in them. In considering the past year, the Transition House staff is honoured to share with you the resiliency, adaptability and courage of both staff and participants of the Transition House program. The following quote eloquently sums up all the work at the Transition House.

We don't even know how strong we are until we are forced to bring that hidden strength forward. In times of tragedy, of war, of necessity, people do amazing things. The human capacity for survival and renewal is awesome.

DROP IN AND OUTREACH WHISTLER

Whistler Drop-in Centre faced unique challenges this year due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The team guickly refocused their efforts on an outreach model, meeting individuals where they were in the community as the drop-in space was closed for several months. It also allowed staff to focus more on Pemberton and the northern communities for services and this is something that will be carried forward in the future due to its success.

WWC volunteers stepped up to offer an extra hand which allowed staff to focus solely on clients' needs.

Although in person groups were not able to run, WWC adapted to have the Mama Baby Connection prenatal groups online to keep a much-needed connection for moms to be. Staff hopes to resume in person wellness programs in the near future.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Throughout 2020, the two long term affordable housing units in Pemberton were occupied.

HSWC provided safe, stable, affordable housing for woman and children after leaving an abusive relationship or unsafe living situation. Their stay was for up to one year. HSWC staff look forward to a time when there are more units in each of the communities served.

PEARL'S SAFE HOME

Pearl's Safe Home is a medium barrier, pet friendly facility. In 2020/21, the Safe Home provided residential services for 12 adults for a total of 182 adult bed nights. These stays are generally 10 days in length but have increased substantially during this past year. HSWC has also noticed an increase in single women staying at the Safe Home. This may be due to the uncertainty of stability during the pandemic. Staff has further developed emergency accommodation protocols with a few local hotels and lodges in both Whistler and Pemberton that help with overflow when the Safe Home is full or someone is unable to leave their community due to work, their support system, and children.

Quote from Individual utilizing PSH Services

As soon as I had my first conversation with staff, I instantly had this overwhelming feeling that I wasn't alone for the first time in a very long time. I was provided with contacts, options, support, and resources that I could reach out to day or night. I was blown away with their efforts and more so the reassurance that I would be safe.



Children Served

The Homeless Prevention Program helps bridge the gaps that many individuals experience with high housing costs in order to access safe housing for themselves and their children. The most commonly used subsidy was rent for women and children leaving violence. Other subsidies include security deposits for rental units, heat, medical expenses, moving, and food. The need for this subsidy far exceeds the budget HSWC has and speaks to the ongoing housing affordability problem in the region. This year, the Homeless Prevention Program had a one year pilot project of an additional \$1800 monthly which was a huge help. In 2020, HSWC helped 42 women and 48 children in the Sea to Sky Corridor with 188 subsidies dispersed in total. Additionally, the loss of income for many during the pandemic was difficult and many women in lockdown were unable to leave their situations due to the difficulty in finding new accommodation during this time.

PROGRAMS

THE PEACE TEAM



The PEACE team is made up of five amazing women who are dedicated to working with children, youth, and families and supporting them through some of their most difficult times in life. Each comes with their own story and

wealth of experience. This past year, HSWC was fortunate to have two practicum students, Paige and Sophia. Thank you to both for the energy and knowledge that they brought to the space.

Summer camps offer self-identifying girls ages 9 to 12 in Squamish, Whistler, and Pemberton an opportunity to build self-confidence through self-expression and self-care; build connections through friendships; and connect with community and nature.

HSWC was fortunate to offer Summer Camps this year. Extra precautions were set up to ensure limited risk of exposure to Covid-19 and much of the camps were held outdoors.

PROGRAMS

SQUAMISH 2020 CAMP

The Squamish 2020 Camp was held in July with eight girls between the ages of 9-12.

Daily activities consisted of: nature art, playing games at Nexen Beach, walking through the Squamish Estuary, writing poetry, and re-purposing items from Pearl's and putting on a fashion show. It was an amazing week of laughter, creativity, silliness, and bonding.

WHISTLER 2020 CAMP

The Whistler 2020 Camp was held in August. Ten girls attended between the ages 9-11.

Each day consisted of community walks, including a hike to the Whistler Train Wreck, and focused on connecting with nature, with each other, and community. Activities included: stencil making and spray painting, painting outdoors on snowboards, nature art, journaling, team building games, improv, and a fashion show using upcycled clothing. Thank you for all the donations that made this possible.

PEMBERTON 2020 CAMP

The Pemberton 2020 Camp was held in a gorgeous yoga studio in July.

Due to Covid-19, only six girls could participate. Daily activities included: being in community and nature, short hikes, art, painting snowboards, visits to the community garden and One Mile Lake, scavenger hunts and games, and just having loads of fun.









PROGRAMS

PEACE PROGRAM

THE PEACE (Prevention, Education, Advocacy, Counselling and Empowerment) Program offers specific individual, family, and group counselling for children and youth ages 3-18, and their families that have experienced violence, abuse and/or conflict in the home including families that are going through a difficult separation or divorce.

The PEACE Program is an important part of HSWC's fight to end violence against women and children. In Canada, 80% of women who experience domestic violence report that their children also witness the abuse.

Additionally, children who are exposed to violence in the home suffer emotional trauma, have poor educational outcomes, and are at risk of using violence to solve problems. By helping children and youth deal with traumatic life events, develop coping skills, and better understand the context of healthy relationships, HSWC can help end the intergenerational cycle of violence for those children.

CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILY PROGRAMS AND COVID-19

March 2020 marked the start of Covid-19 and put a pause on in-person sessions and school presentations. In order to continue to supporting the families connected with HSWC counsellors and meet the needs of the communities, the counselling team made the switch to video sessions. These were challenging at first but with a little bit of practice, the team managed to make the video sessions work and were even able to make them fun! This strange and uncertain time brought lots of new ideas, creativity, and new ways of working with children, youth, and families. Luckily, however, the PEACE team was able to do more in-person sessions beginning in May 2020 and has continued through today. Of course, the option for online or phone sessions have remained in place for families that preferred those methods.

INDIVIDUAL COUNSELLING PROGRAM

The Individual Counselling Program is provided from a psycho-educational approach which utilizes a variety of counselling techniques and strategies such as art, play, expressive art, nature-inspired art, mindfulness and regulation techniques, and discussion to create an opportunity for children to deal with the traumatic events in their lives in a safe, confidential, and nurturing environment.


Individual counselling sessions happened in a variety of settings including the Whistler Drop-in Centre, Squamish Drop-in Centre, within the school setting, and outdoor spaces, taking advantage of the wilderness environment of the Sea to Sky Corridor. Sessions are set up in a way to make children, youth, and their families feel comfortable and safe and often involve activities like art, games, chatting, having fun, and going for nature walks together.

The PEACE Program has maintained a small wait list and has managed to offer support to families requiring it.

GROUP COUNSELLING PROGRAM

The Group Counselling Program offers many different types of groups depending on the need in each community. Many of the groups focus on building friendships, empowerment, self-esteem, self-expression, changing family dynamics, hard to handle feelings and healthy ways of coping with them, community, and sharing of stories and experiences. Due to Covid-19, there were not as many support groups available due to challenges with space, interest, and the ability to plan.

GROUPS HELD IN 2020/2021

Whistler Secondary School Group

"GIRLS LUNCH GROUP" for students in grade 8. The group's aim was to co-create a safe space where girls could connect with each other in an open and meaningful way and dialogue around topics they were interested in, such as healthy relationships, anxiety, body image, and wellness.

Pemberton Secondary School

"TEEN GIRLS GROUP" focusing on exploring topics together they are interested in such as cooking and art. This group ran for the whole school year.

By working with school staff (teachers and counsellors), HSWC PEACE counsellors were able to offer more groups, individual sessions, and presentations to children and youth that may otherwise not access HSWC services or receive the support they need.

YOUTH EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Youth Education Program is a school based educational presentation that encourages discussions with children and youth on healthy relationships, boundaries, consent, sexual harassment, sexual violence, sexting, cyberbullying, how to keep safe, and community/online resources.

• IN THE 2020/21 SCHOOL YEAR, Believe presentations were delivered to approximately 517 students in 22 classrooms in Squamish, Whistler, and Pemberton from grades 5 to 7.

HSWC believes that continuing to focus on prevention work is important and will make a positive impact on the reduction of violence, abuse, and conflict that a child or youth may experience in their lifetime.

- · 11-YEAR OLDS are the most targeted group by predators online in Canada.
- · YOUNG CANADIANS are more likely to experience sexual assault. The rate of sexual assault for Canadians age 15 to 24 is 18 times higher than that of Canadians 55 and older.
- · 82% OF ALL VICTIMS of sexual assault under the age of 18 are female identifying.
- · HYPER-MASCULINITY the notion that masculinity is determined by strength and power - is damaging for men, women, and everyone in between. It promotes violence and entitlement and devalues feelings and emotions.

HSWC staff was not able to connect with a student group as easily as previous years. However, HSWC was very fortunate to have Quest student Sarrah interested in learning more about the education project and co-facilitating these presentations.

PEARL'S VALUE & VINTAGE

Pearl's began the fiscal year like no other year in the history of Pearl's Value & Vintage. The realities and requirements of the Public Health Office to manage Covid-19 transmission required a closure on March 16th, 2020 for what was planned to be two weeks; as it turns out it, Pearl's was closed for three months!





During this time, Pearl's staff utilized the opportunity to freshen up and renovate the store. With the store closed and therefore no revenue being generated, it was time to get creative and try to refresh the store without spending much money. Pearl's Value & Vintage Assistant Manager, Val Nagy, applied her creative eye to the project and led an incredible transformation with the help of some additional staff, furloughed due to the closure, who volunteered their time. The transformation included repainting, moving around entire departments, and reusing fixtures. Once complete, the store looked amazing for the grand reopening on June 8, 2020. The store reopened with a plethora of new policies and procedures to keep customers, staff, and volunteers safe including limiting capacity, quarantining donations, and more. With the limitations on how many customers could shop at one time, there were lineups for the first time in the history of Pearl's! It was such a challenging time for the Pearl's team and really showed what this incredible team was capable of achieving together.

It is so important to acknowledge Pearl's customers and the community of Squamish and the Sea to Sky Corridor. The customers rallied around and supported the store by holding onto their donations during the pandemic closure. Then they came back and shopped and continued with their generous donations. They were so happy to see Pearl's back open. Pearl's is a social hub for many people in our community. Staff heard from customers that they really missed the connection and interaction and sense of community they felt when they shopped at Pearl's and were happy to see the store reopen better than ever. Their generosity and loyalty continued with enthusiasm and Pearl's staff is so grateful!

Pearl's is excited for a brighter year ahead with some sense of normality and is so grateful for the support of the community and wonderful team of staff and volunteers.



PROGRAMMING

SQUAMISH DROP-IN CENTRE

The Squamish Drop-in Centre is dedicated to creating a safe, non-judgmental, caring, and healthy community for women and their children to seek support and resources. The Squamish Drop-in Centre is open Monday through Thursday 10 am-4 pm. Drop-in services include: crisis support, information, resources such as clothing vouchers, toiletries, and food, referrals, assisted access with government and non-government forms, systems, and processes, and computer and fax machine use.

This past year has been a year of many changes due to Covid-19 and the renovations of HSWC's 3rd Ave drop-in centre. The Drop-in Centre was closed for a short period of time in March and April while HSWC leadership navigated the changes with restrictions and developed safety protocols to ensure the safety of staff and clients. HSWC staff was happy to open the doors in May to be available for the community. In January 2021, drop-in staff packed up the space and temporarily relocated to a smaller space on 2nd Ave so renovation work could begin with the intention to be back in the newly renovated space in August 2021. Staff looks forward to having more space for staff and clients with two counselling rooms, two support rooms, two bathrooms, and a bigger kitchen with group space as well as more staff offices for the growing team and programming. This past year, the themes have been focused a lot around support with accessing legal advice through RISE Legal Resources which has been an amazing partnership and has provided much needed support to many people. Additionally, there has been a large increase in support phone calls over previous years, as well as many more requests for rental subsidies and support with finding housing.

MULTICULTURAL OUTREACH PROGRAM

The Multicultural Outreach Program in Squamish offers one on one support services. Services includes: crisis support, referrals, assisted access, information on community services and resources, help with forms and more. There is support in a variety of languages available by phone. The Multicultural Program supports immigrant, refugee, and non-status women. Despite this past year providing challenges with in-person support, support workers continued to find creative ways to reach women in community that needed support through phone and online formats as well as in-person support with safety measures in place. Community outreach and education has happened through online presentations.

GENDER DIVERSE INCLUSION PROJECT AND OUTREACH

The Gender Diverse Inclusion (GDI) Project and Outreach is a new program that HSWC has had in the works for over a year, though it experienced some stalls because of Covid-19.

HSWC was finally able to get some traction with this project after receiving funding from the Community Foundations of Canada and Women and Gender Equality Canada in December 2020. Previous to receiving the funding, HSWC started connecting with the community to seek out interested individuals to be on the Gender Diverse Inclusion Committee. This committee, made up of three staff members and six community members, meets monthly to focus on moving the HSWC forward in GDI initiatives, policies and procedures, language, and inclusive spaces. The GDI committee is working to develop a set of recommendations for HSWC staff to incorporate into practice. HSWC hired a Gender Diverse Inclusion Outreach worker in Jan 2021.

Initiatives of the GDI Project in 2020/21:

- · Started incorporating visibly inclusive changes to the drop-in space such as posters, brochures, and inclusive artwork
- · Training for GDI Committee with Ravyn Wngz and Felix from WAVAW (change management)
- · Staff training with Felix from WAVAW and service delivery with trans folks
- · Developed a list of resources with support channels for the LGBTQ2S+ community for staff and clients
- · Making HR revisions for job postings work in progress
- · Two GDI social drop-ins were held in May and June.

OPEN DOOR GROUP/WORKBC PROGRAM

It's been an interesting year for everyone, including everyone at the WorkBC Centre in Squamish. These services unfolded slightly differently than those of the HSWC. Soon after the pandemic hit in Squamish, WorkBC closed offices to the public and transitioned to fully virtual and phone-based supports. Outreach locations similarly closed down. This meant all the workshops, client needs assessments, and form signatures were transferred online in a matter of days! During this period, many of the outreach plans, marketing activities, and stated events were cancelled, as staff directed skills towards learning and teaching WorkBC clients to use the online processes.

Some months later, WorkBC began gradually reopening and is now open fully but still operating with a skeleton crew with some working from home each day. Some clients have been returning but, especially among younger clients, many seem to prefer to meet and sign documents virtually.

A few points about the last year:

- · It has been a year of change! WorkBC has three new staff members and have had some shifts in roles for existing staff members as well.
- · All of the workshop material has been updated for virtual delivery.
- · From July 2020-June 2021, there were six referrals to the HSWC and eight referrals from the HSWC to WorkBC.
- · There has been ongoing collaboration with the Squamish Lil'Wat Cultural Centre and the Indigenous Youth Ambassador program.
- · There has been an opening of program accessibility. Previously programs such as the Sechelt Jobs in Demand program and the Sechelt and Vancouver Self-Employment Programs were in-person. Due to virtual delivery they have opened up to Squamish residents.

- · The eligibility for the Wage Subsidy program was recently expanded to include all case-managed clients. This means if someone is eligible for case managed services and there is a rationale to do so, WorkBC can pay a portion of their wages for the first six months of employment.
- · Many clients, especially those working in industries impacted by Covid-19, have decided to upgrade skills or transition into more stable careers and have accessed WorkBC to do so. Whether it is Short-Term training (up to 30 hours), Short Duration Training (30-180 hours) or Occupational Skills Training (180 hours-2 years) many are seeking jobs that are "pandemic proof".

WorkBC staff look forward very much to seeing how things shift in the future and remains committed to serving the community.





ADULT **PROGRAMMING**

SEXUAL ASSAULT RESPONSE AND PREVENTION PROGRAM (SARP)

While the onset of the new service year was muted by the advent of Covid-19, the HSWC and SARP explored opportunities to collaborate with other agencies, build internal capacity, and increase awareness about the Sexual Assault Programs in the Sea to Sky Corridor.

The temporary cessation of Sexual Assault and Response Committee (SARC) meetings allowed further evaluation on regional strategic directions for responding to sexual violence; inclusive of a renewed focus on youth who experience sexual violence. Examining the potential appeal of the Third Party Reporting Option (TPR) to youth invited passionate participation when the SARC reestablished in September via Zoom, with the goals of creating easy to follow flow-charts for youth experiencing sexual violence, as well as developing internal policy for mature minors. Another of area of growth for the SARP has been addressing sexual harassment in the workplace, with Whistler team members developing resources for the hospitality sector, with the hotel industry in particular reaching out to the Whistler Womens Centre for support.

Projects and initiatives of the Sexual Assault Response and Prevention Program in 2020/21:

- · At the end of March, 2020, it was announced from the Civil Forfeiture Office that the SARP was awarded \$30,000 towards "Supported Pathways", an outreach pilot project designed to attach survivors of sexual assault to follow-up local resources of their own choosing. Secondly, the project will promote increased awareness of the Third-Party Reporting Option.
- · Hired an internal staff member (Suzie Soman) as a Specialized Resource Worker to support the Supportive Pathways Project, her community knowledge and years of experience with Options for Sexual Health made her a standout addition to the SARP team.

- · Southern Stl'atl'imx Health Society (SSHS) received funding for three years for a new SAR Coordinator/ Educator which is very exciting as it provides a dedicated worker in the north providing SA services and supports. Alana Desorsy has expressed appreciation for the support and guidance provided by the HSWC to their brand-new service.
- · Developed guidelines and tools for the Third Party Reporting Option, including information on how to determine when a TPR needs to break confidentiality and how to provide the TPR Option within the Covid-19 Pandemic context.
- · An internal HSWC staff member (Sam Marra) was trained to take TPR's in Whistler so now HSWC has all communities covered. Additionally, two staff members (Sam and Kelsey Watson) work in Whistler and Pemberton to provide outreach and education around Sexual Assault services, options, and how to incorporate information and policies into the workplace.
- · Started a sub-committee of SARC to focus on working with and supporting mature minors. Liaised with many organizations through EVA BC and BCSTH in order to developed flow chart, policies, and procedures.
- · Received another grant from the Civil Forfeiture Office for the SARP towards the "Traverse" Project.

REPORT

COMMUNITY DONATIONS

The past year brought challenges to everyone and the non-profit sector was no different. Pearl's Value and Vintage is one of HSWC's main funding sources for underfunded programs and operating expenses and with the store closed from March 17, 2020 to June 8, 2020, the annual budget had to be significantly amended. Because of how the community came forward with unparalleled generosity and combined with incredible government and foundation support, the society was able to continue to deliver all of the planned programs and services and even expand upon them in order to ensure to meet the needs of survivors. Donations this year increased by 142% from last year with 774 donations from 574 individuals and businesses. In this unprecedented time, the increased support from the community helped HSWC through the pandemic and allowed staff to concentrate on helping those who needed the most support.

3RD PARTY FUNDRAISER HIGHLIGHT

On September 26, 2020, Maude Cyr, a Pemberton resident, mother of two, and education assistant at L'École La Vallee De Pemberton, left from HSWC's downtown Squamish Drop-In Centre and ran an astonishing 110 kilometres to Lil'wat Nation territory following the Sea to Sky Trail. She paired this with a third-party fundraising campaign and raised \$6,412.00! Maude's run was to fund HSWC's PEACE (Prevention, Education, Advocacy, Counselling, Empowerment) programs and raise awareness about the importance of free support services for children who have experienced violence or high conflict in their home. Greatest thanks to Maude and everyone who supported HSWC along the way.

3RD PARTY FUNDRAISERS

Howe Sound Women's Centre Society continues to receive incredible donations as a result of community-led Third Party Fundraisers. This year we would like to thank Capra Running, Maude Cyr, A Little Something Co., Queen Bee

Boudoir, Whimsy Daisy Designs, The Body Shop, Tapley's Mum's, and many others for your fundraisers! We are entirely grateful for all of hard work and efforts.

RENO AND MATCHING GIFT PROGRAM

In late 2020, the society started fundraising for a muchneeded renovation of the Squamish Drop-In Centre. The first big success of this effort was a \$45,000 grant from the Katz Amsterdam Charitable Trust. Shortly after, HSWC received notification from the Whistler Blackcomb Foundation that they would award a \$70,000 matching grant to help span the last bit remaining of the final fundraising goal of \$450,000. The community stepped up in a huge way to receive the full funding and up to March 2021, donated \$60,465 towards the renovation. The society is on track to receive the full amount and wants to thank Katz Amsterdam Charitable Trust, the Whistler Blackcomb Foundation, and the supportive donor community for making this renovation possible. Through these donations, the Centre's renovation will include the addition of more children's counselling space, crisis support rooms, and a group facilitation area. Additionally, by moving administrative offices to the second floor, HSWC has the capacity to grow the team in the future, ensuring the society is able to provide much needed supportive services to all survivors of gender-based violence for years to come.

MONTHLY GIVING PROGRAM

A million thanks to this supportive group of donors making a difference for the community.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY AUCTION

Due to Covid-19, the annual Raising our Voices through Song fundraiser wasn't possible and the first ever Pearl's On The Runway fashion show was canceled. With auction item donations already collected, staff switched gears to a Covid-friendly online auction in conjunction with International Women's Day held on March 8th, 2021. International Women's Day is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity and this year's theme was "Choose to Challenge". This theme invited participants to pledge to challenge and call out gender bias and inequality


by posting photos with their hand raised. Staff created the graphic shown here with the #choosetochallenge and #IWD2021 hashtags, inviting customers at Pearl's and passersby to pledge and post, creating awareness for International Women's Day. This grant will support Whistler Women's Centre (WWC), a Howe Sound Women's Centre Society program. Grant funds will allow the WWC to operate three days a week of drop-in services and two days a week outreach, as well as additional outreach and meeting with clients outside of office hours. WWC drop-in support outreach services are available at both Whistler & Pemberton libraries. We continue to offer safe, confidential support services to vulnerable women, trans, non-binary, Two-Spirit, and other diverse-gender individuals and children, particularly those experiencing high conflict, violence, or abuse. Grant funds allow for the delivery of existing and new programming to support diversity with various workshops. It will enable us to secure and arrange childcare to support the women participating and help remove barriers. These programs will include: bringing in artists, therapists, and professionals to expand our programming to reach more women in our community. We will offer wellness programming like weekly karma yoga, breathwork, meditation classes, self-defence sessions, healthy eating on a budget, along with creative programs requested by clients.

We are developing spring programming to align with the current climate and challenges of the ongoing pandemic with a specific focus to meet the needs of the multifaceted populations we are serving. Our objective includes the delivery of relevant and effective workshops, providing healthy food on-site, support such as childcare onsite or other options, transportation assistance and help with various supports unique to one's situation and barriers.

The Whistler Women's Centre is an established program of Howe Sound Women's Centre, however, with the increased rates of gender-based violence seen during the Covid-19 Pandemic, the WWC is offering more services than ever before including additional housing using hotels when the Transition and Safe homes are at full capacity. HSWC has also started gender-diverse and inclusion work to better support trans, Two-Spirit, and non-binary survivors of gender-based violence which will increase the population served. We will continue to expand our services to reflect the needs of those who come to us in the community with diverse backgrounds and needs.

The WWC offers clients confidential, non-judgmental support, community referrals, access to resources, advocacy and systemic guidance from our trauma-informed, safe space. Our programming focuses on

Emergency Transition Housing: In the absence of emergency transition housing in Whistler, the WWC is a direct link to accessing emergency safe housing at Pearl's Place Transition House in Squamish and Pearl's Safe Home in Pemberton, and offers outreach support, advocacy, counselling and referrals to other resources to mitigate the effects of gender-based violence and Intimate Partner Violence.

Community Outreach: During the past year the WWC has had very limited community engagement due to the pandemic. However, WWC staff continues to provide individual outreach supports by meeting women in the community with safety measures in place

Sexual Assault Support and Prevention: The WWC offers sexual assault education and prevention as well as front-line support for survivors, and participates in advocacy awareness and education initiatives for the service industry in Whistler in addition to providing Third Party reporting services for sexual assaults in the community.

Access to necessities for clients and their children: The WWC provides practical items such as gently used clothing, books, toys, personal care products, food, and other necessities at no cost to anyone in need in the community. The WWC serves the unique and diverse needs of all survivors of gender-based violence, bringing together clients of various cultures and ages, including Multicultural and First Nations communities. HSWC staff knows that this work contributes to the social fabric of the community, the social attachments of its residents, and contributes to the wellbeing of our community and society at large. The WWC drop-in programs give all women, trans, non-binary, Two – Spirit and other gender-diverse individuals in the community the opportunity to build their village of support, gather tools and resources, and prevent isolation; fostering wellness and a sense of community.

Enhancing the Resort Experience

Whistler is a unique resort-based community that welcomes people and ideas from around the world, while maintaining a rich local mountain culture. When an individual faces unexpected challenges, including but not limited to violence and abuse, they turn to their most trusted support network for guidance. Most Whistler residents and visitors alike are far away from home and in difficult times may feel isolated, lost, or alone. The WWC enhances the resort experience by providing confidential guidance and support to survivors of gender-based violence during these times, mitigating some of the harms of violence.

Protecting the Environment

Through the community clothing and necessities swap, WWC is able to divert gently used goods from the landfill. WWC is also able to divert any overflow to Pearl's Value and Vintage, the HSWC's social enterprise. Furthermore, offering gender-based violence support services within the Whistler community allows for a reduction in the frequency of trips to Squamish or Vancouver, therefore reducing the environmental impact of Whistler residents accessing such services outside of the community.

Ensuring Economic Viability

While some survivors fleeing violence and abuse choose to leave their community and relocate for their own safety, the WWC offers safe housing and ongoing support to give survivors the options to increase their safety and heal from violence and abuse while staying within their home community by offering free, non-judgmental, confidential support to all survivors in the community, the WWC supports Whister residents in continuing to engage fully in economic, social, cultural, and recreational opportunities that make Whister the vibrant community that it is. HSWC also offers specialized job skills development and employment exercises for clients who have experienced violence and abuse, in partnership with the WorkBC programs. Employeesing survivors to remain in or re-enter the workforce after experiencing trauma and abuse ensures an equal opportunity to develop and maintain financial independence and contribute to the local economy. The WWC Homeless Prevention Program also provides rental subsidies for survivors of gender-based violence and children fleeing violence to support them to find stable and affordable housing.

Partnering for success

Working collaboratively in partnership with other agencies, law enforcement, and the justice system is paramount to realizing the HSWC vision of a violence free future. 

There are three main priorities the Club would like to help fund if this grant application were is successful. The first is to contribute to expanding the Track Attack programs, where there are a growing number of younger skiers who are keen to race and gain experience of high performance Nordic skiing. We would like to support these athletes in travelling to races and providing high performance development programs. The Skills Development Program has been running for the past 19 years and is aligned with the Sport Canada/Nordiq Canada's Long Term Athlete Development Pathway (LTAD). There are around 10 Whistler Nordics Track Attack skiers who are participating in the Teck TA Championships in Kelowna Feb 26-27. This shows there are a number of motivated athletes who are now getting to a stage where they require more intensive training sessions on snow and dryland and more qualified coaches. The Club would like to provide more higher level coaches to support these athletes and we would like to develop a Track Attack Corridor United Program that will attract youth Sea 2 Sky cross country skiers U12-U16 that will train together. The vision is to create a strong cohort to be part of, more higher level coaching, and a clear development pathway within the corridor.

The second purpose of this grant is to put towards expanding our extremely successful Masters programs and attracting more coaches in the view to offer more quality programs. This season we have had the amazing opportunity of having both Chris Manhard (BC Provincial Coach for CCBC) and Maria Lundgren (Assistant Coach for CCBC) coach the Masters Program and it has been widely recognized by the community that this program is a huge resource for the community over the years. As the pandemic restrictions are lifted, both Chris and Maria will be travelling with the BC Team more and we are looking to train more coaches under their direct supervision to continue to offer the Masters program and to the expansion of this program in the future.

The third purpose is to put this funding towards the Club and office upgrade. Whistler Nordics is looking for a permanent facility to make a legacy for the future of the Club. This would help the Club be a contributing facility to the community and it would also help with Club awareness in the community.

All in all, Whistler Nordic Ski Club has seen many of the local youth progress through the Skills Development Program over the past few years and these young skiers are now looking for the next stage of High Performance Programs, which the Club offered a few years ago to our most successful athletes now competing in World events.

Our view for the future is to expand our youth and adult programs to promote the sport within the local community, which sees Nordic skiing as way to prove a sense of belonging in the community and keeping a healthy lifestyle for life.

Due to the pandemic the community saw a huge increase in interest in cross country skiing last season. Our older Track Attack programs have grown in participation and we would like to see more expansion in our programs to maintain the teenagers in the sport. 

The purpose of the grant is to assist WYSC to cover a small amount of costs in order to keep soccer affordable for all its members.

Soccer is one of a very few team sports in our community and keeping it accessible to all is extremely important.

These coaches dedicate many hours both on and off the field to our organization, giving them a sense of pride and contributing to and supporting our communities' children.

5/ WYSC encourages older members to become qualified referees and supports and mentors them on the field. This helps them become confident in their capacity to referee and provides them with the opportunity to keep active and involved in the community whilst being paid.

6/ WYSC encourages and mentors older members to volunteer on field with younger players enabling them to complete required volunteer hours for school. It's also a great opportunity for all to experience new opportunities and be involved with various age groups within our community.

WYSC strives to meet the needs of the community as well as accommodate our unique winter sport opportunities. We look for ways to make participating easy by removing barriers: This season we will continue to offer various registration options to our U12 - U18 players to reflect our ski and snowboard season. We are planning our full season teams to being with their team in the Spring this year so that the team can build comradery and plan for the full season from Spring to Fall. Registration options include full season soccer to a training player option to the seasonal one we had playing options for everyone while maintaining our standard providing a place for everyone. We look for ways to develop physical literacy in our participants ensuring our players are well rounded, capable and confident athletes whose love and ability to participate are established for life.

With tournament play being allowed again, we are hoping to offer a one-day tournament at the end of June, that will host U10 girls and boys for one day each to offer a competitive, friendly opportunity for all players. We had intended to offer this last year however, with Covid continuing to be prevalent and limiting we postponed the even. We look forward to trying again this year!

Finally, we are able to offer Kicking in Schools to both Myrtle Philip and Spring Creek Elementary School this year. Offering this program in both schools, will include more of our community's youth as well as their teachers the opportunity to enhance their school day experience. We believe that meeting kids at their school takes away barriers to participation while developing the teacher's competence to coach soccer.







The Multicultural Community Kitchen program focuses around cultural food sessions bringing immigrants and newcomers and all community members together in order to build community connections and intercultural awareness and understanding. Through this program, we seek to promote a greater sense of belonging to the community for newcomers and immigrants, and to create a more inclusive community environment through food.

In 2022-2023, we plan to extend this program to add a nutrition digital badge for local immigrants/newcomers, expand opportunities for family and youth cultural interaction and learning through: a family-focused community kitchen, the delivery of a week-long culture camp for children aged 7 to 12, and the pilot of an after school culture camp. Using our experience of the last two years, we will continue to deliver in a mix of in-person and remote modes – dependent on public health orders in effect. 

We are requesting \$15,000 to support the current and upcoming alumni of our Work 2 Live program, who have found a home in our community and continue to work, live, and explore in the Sea to Sky Corridor. Over 100 participants have graduated from Work 2 Live since 1998. We are currently actively supporting 5-6 graduates at any one time (approximately 11 total per year), and we have 7 more set to graduate in 2022.

Work 2 Live is a thriving supportive employment and housing program for our province's most vulnerable young people—those who are experiencing poverty, mental health issues, and/or homelessness. Many have aged out of government care and/or are Indigenous or LGBTQ2S+ and come to Whistler to find stability and family in the mountains.

Unlike some other programs that serve youth, we do not allow our participants to age out; rather, we continue to support them with the same unconditional care we give to current participants in the program while we help them transition into stable, healthy independence. Throughout the program, we become a part of their safety net, many of whom have no close, reliable family ties.

2021 offered many challenges for our alumni, primarily the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting mental health challenges, unstable housing, lack of affordability, increased isolation, unstable employment, and a more difficult time accessing other support programs and healthcare. We are experiencing more emergency calls for help with buying groceries, making rent payments, or help navigating complex challenges.

The funds will be used to cover staff wages for our Co-Executive Directors and to cover one-on-one support for alumni (formerly: graduates) of our Work 2 Live program. This will look like:

- -mental health support (trauma-informed, low-barrier counseling provided through Vancouver Coastal Health and other community partners, and referrals to community programs)
- -emergency funding (groceries, bills, healthcare)
- -housing support (help finding, securing, and maintaining healthy housing)
- -employment support (help finding, securing, and maintaining employment)
- -life skills education & training (RentSmart Certificate, budgeting, soft skills, etc.)
- -practical and emotional support (through individual check-ins)
- -providing direct support to alumni
- -providing direct support to the Programming Team, who are also support alumni (in addition to 9 current Work 2 Live participants)

Fund-raising

Many charities engage in fund-raising activities such as bingo, dinners, golf tournaments, etc. Certain payments made in the context of fund-raising activities (such as a ticket for a lottery draw, an admission fee, etc.) are not eligible for an official receipt, since the transfer of funds within the fund-raising activity does not meet the legal definition of a gift. Please refer to the aforementioned pamphlet *Tax Advantages of Donating to Charity* for assistance. Filing the Charity's Annual Return

Every year each registered charity must file a *Registered Charity Information Return* (form *T3010* - the "Return") and a financial statement within six months following its fiscal year end. As you have indicated that the charity's fiscal year end is May 31, its first return should be filed on or before November 30, 2003 for the fiscal period ending May 31, 2003. The information required on the Return may differ substantially from that available in your current books and records. Here are some of the items of information you will have to provide on the Return:

- a breakdown of gifts including those for which **official tax receipts** were issued and those from other registered charities;
- disbursements, including amounts spent on fund-raising, administrative expenditures, political activities, and those spent specifically on charitable programs; and,
- a breakdown of remuneration to directors, executive officers, to employees engaged in charitable activities and to employees engaged in other activities.

Revocation of Charitable Status

In the event that the charity loses its charitable status, either on a voluntary basis or for cause, it would lose its tax-exempt status as well as its authority to issue official receipts for income tax purposes. Further, it would be subject to a tax equal to the value of any remaining assets not disposed of in a prescribed manner. Please refer to the section entitled *Revocation of a charity's registration* at page 13 of the document entitled *Registered Charities and the Income Tax Act*.





"Why do I Choose to Celebrate Pride?" | A letter from a graduate

Fern is a superbly talented, gorgeous artist, nature-enthusiast, thinker, transgender woman, and Work 2 Live graduate. In this post, she shares her story of finding her happiness and living her truth. Don't forget to read the post she wrote last year: What Does it Mean to Celebrate Pride in 2020?

Trigger warnings in this post for: homophobia, uses of homophobic slurs, suicidal thoughts, suicidal ideation, suicide attempts, intense shame (some based in religion), PTSD, child abuse, threats of violence by a parent, mention of murder by a family member, mention of stays on a psychiatric ward, mentions self harm, and mentions of grief.

Why Do I Choose to Celebrate Pride? | A letter from a graduate

I am a young, 23 year old woman, and I am also transgender. I always knew I was one of the girls, and different from all the other boys. I just knew, simple as that. There was a girl inside of me, yet all anyone could see was boy. I just couldn't understand it! However I knew who I was, and that was enough. Reading books, swimming in the sea pretending to be a mermaid, and adventuring in the forest like a fairy became my safe spaces to express myself, the me inside that no one could see.

When I lived at home with my religious parents, I was taught to feel shame. To love who I wanted to love was a sin, and to express my spirit was an abomination.

I was taught that the Devil was whispering in my ear with every thought of "temptation" that passed through my mind. I was told the only way to eternal happiness was to marry of the opposite sex, have children, and go to church. I know now my parents thought they were trying to protect me from a life they saw as dangerous and sinful. I disagree, but I understand their perspective.

I still remember my mum saying something to me one day "if I ever catch you wearing your sister's clothing, I'll castrate you myself." Little did she know I had been doing that for years, since I was 4 years old. I told her about this one day, and she said she didn't remember saying it at all. But I did. I remember every time I was called a fag, faggot, ponce, fairy, pervert, and abomination. I remember all the heated arguments we had, the times I had to run away from my dad as he chased me down the street. I remember fearing my family murdering me, I had nightmares for years of being hunted down and killed by my dad.



I remember wanting to kill myself so bad. It was self-consuming. I thought I could never achieve happiness, that I was destined to the rot in the ground before my 20 birthday, and that it would be by my own hand. The shame, the self hatred, the rage, the sadness...it was overpowering.

The choice to me was clear: I either stay in the small rural town that

didn't tolerate people like me, and die within the year...or move out to the city and take a risk.

So at 17, I packed up my bags, and left. I was homeless for the first 5 months. I was in a psych ward indefinitely, seeking treatment after attempting suicide for the last time. It was not easy. It was very very difficult. I had so many lessons I had to unlearn, things I had told myself again and again. I had to overcome my fear of the Devil being inside of me. I had to grieve the loss of my family. I struggled with poverty and discrimination, and I struggled against a system that made it hard to become who I am.

I was a child in exile, a self-made orphan, yet I was also a young woman coming into my own.

It was only through the support of organizations in the city that I was able to survive. I entered into the foster care system, found housing, and began to find my feet. I graduated high school, I went to college and studied languages for a while, and learned to love myself along the way. Thanks to organizations like Zero Ceiling, I was able to get a foot up in life, and find ways to live a life that I loved!

It took me many years to come to a point where I can celebrate who I am, I had to heal the hurt and trauma that accompanied my coming out. Years of therapy, hiking, and healing had to occur before I could even begin to feel some kind of sense of pride.

Now I am a happy, healthy young woman living on a beautiful island in the pacific ocean. I love to hike in the forest and up into the alpine. Identifying trees is a passion of mine, as is picking edible berries and plants. I still love to swim in the ocean and pretend to be a mermaid, and my friends call me a forest nymph often. I have always known who I was and now I am living my best life being who I am! I have grown into an intelligent young lady, with an ever expanding knowledge of the natural world. I have conquered my fear of heights, and can snowboard with confidence. I have healed my relationship with my mother, after years apart. She now calls me Fern, and it means the world to me. Happiness is possible...you have to follow your bliss.

Why do I choose to celebrate pride?



I celebrate pride because it symbolizes the freedom to express my true and authentic self. Who we are is sacred. We should not feel shame for our complexity and beauty! I thank the pioneers who have come thousands of years before us for paving the path for us. The mission of our completely volunteer run group is to increase local knowledge of and appreciation for the natural world in the Whistler area. All our events and programs have both a public education and research component that complement each other.

The Natural Environment chapter in the RMOW OCP is about "Protecting, monitoring and restoring the natural environment in Whistler". We feel our events and programs work towards all these outcomes because:

- 1) Nature education leads to appreciation, which leads to stewardship. From all the great feedback we've gotten from the public, students and teachers alike, we know our events have helped community members on their journey towards stewardship/restoring the natural environment in Whistler.
- 2) Without species inventories, we wouldn't be able to share with the community what species call Whistler home. Also, with more data about the species that live in Whistler, better management decisions can be made to support biodiversity. Although this is fundamentally true, information alone is not enough. Without political will (fostered by increased stewardship in point #1), biodiversity conservation can get ignored.
- 3) Finally, our events and programs have been uncovering new species every single year. At a time when most news is about the decline of biodiversity, new species discoveries are hopeful news to celebrate as a community.

For 2022, we are asking the RMOW to support the following ongoing events and programs:

- Whistler BioBlitz This year marks the 16th year of our annual event that promotes biodiversity research, education and stewardship. We will continue to build on two main components with: (a) an in person or virtual school program that reaches as many possible classes in Whistler schools as possible; and (b) surveys from valley bottom to the alpine that further increase our understanding of which species are in Whistler and where they're found.



3. Current year highlights and community benefits:

Providing opportunities to learn about Whistler's natural world strengthens the connection people feel to nature. We all moved to Whistler to be able to call this spectacular landscape home, but in our busy lives or fast sports, the connection piece is often missing.

When you have more people connected to nature, you have more people who are inspired to become natural stewards and take care of this beautiful place for the benefit of all. Through education, connection; through connection, stewardship.

Whistler BioBlitz

This money will be used to support our 16th annual BioBlitz and Canada's longest running event. BioBlitz showcases Whistler's amazing biodiversity through education and the collection of species data.

Education focuses on our school program which has been growing due to the phenomenal response from teachers and their students. We have built strong connections with the local schools and keep working to improve and expand students' exposure to all aspects of local biology and biodiversity delivered by some of BC's best biologists. BioBlitz biologists will again present to local classes (either inperson or virtually), including a wide range of grades from 1 through 12. A big priority for us this year is to finally achieve our goal of presenting at Xit'olacw School in Mt. Currie, assuming the Covid situation allows.

After taking two years off because of Covid, we hope to again offer student internships to experience a day in the life of a field biologist. We also offer public talks about Whistler's amazing biodiversity.

Collection of species data involves scientists scouring different ecosystems to increase our knowledge about the diversity of species in our area. In total, volunteer contributions for BioBlitz exceed 1,000 hours each weekend. In just 14 weekends of BioBlitz spanning back to 2007, BioBlitz findings now represent more than one-third of all records on the Whistler Biodiversity Project (WBP) master list (www.whistlerbiodiversity.ca). Results from the 2021 BioBlitz brings the total number of species documented in our area to:

- 4,602 for Whistler;
- 1,948 for Pemberton Valley; and
- 5,428 distinct species in total.

Finally, BioBlitz has been uncovering new species every single year (including two rare dragonfly species in the past two events). At a time when most news is about the *decline* of biodiversity, new species discovered during BioBlitz is some hopeful news to celebrate as a community.

Fungus Among Us

This money will be used to support our 20th annual event, which showcases Whistler's amazing fungal diversity through education and the collection of hard science. We expect to again attract BC's top mushroom experts to one of the BC's biggest mushroom events. The event includes school presentations, a photo contest, talks with gurus, walks with gurus, a cooking demo, a mushroom display and possibly additional workshops.

This event is a highlight of many residents fall since mushroom hunting has become so popular. The great feedback we get each year from participants and gurus alike is the main reason we run the festival.

Results from the event are collated by the Whistler Biodiversity Project which now tallies up to 991 species of fungus, the majority of which are from Fungus Among Us.

We have been making steps towards increasing the scientific value of fungi collected during the event. Recent genetic work has shown that many of the species thought to be the same as those in Europe (and from where most experts came) are actually distinct North American species. The UBC Beatty Biodiversity Museum will again partner with us to collect and voucher specimens from the event. This effort will increase the reliability of identifications and contribute to the knowledge of BC's fungal species. This initiative is mostly covered by our volunteer efforts and will incur minor additional costs to store specimens and have them properly labelled for future identification.

Data collected during our events in the past 20 years have resulted in one of Canada's most comprehensive fungal inventories. This information is an important resource for the BC Conservation Data Centre, currently conducting its first assessment of fungi (several of the scientists doing that assessment are regular participants at our events). Once complete, this assessment will result in the first list of rare fungi in BC (i.e., those that are Red- and Blue-listed).

Bird Studies

Our Annual Bird Studies includes monthly bird counts, the Breeding Bird Survey and Christmas Bird Count. Most costs are related to: (i) travel expenses for the five out-of-town birders who have conducted the Breeding Bird Survey since the 1970s; and (ii) ancillary costs of the Christmas Bird Count.

We have just been asked by Tourism Whistler to provide information to help create a Sea to Sky Bird Trail that includes Whistler and would be part of the BC Bird Trail (bcbirdtrail.ca). This is through an ecotourism marketing co-op with TW's partners down in Squamish and at Destination BC. Our 30+ years of birding experience makes it possible for us to contribute.

The purpose of the grant is to aid Pathways SMIS to provide family members/caregivers of those who suffer from a serious mental illness with peer support, in-depth education, advocacy, programs and services at no cost to the community.

This grant will also help Pathways SMIS address some of the related issues that local businesses and employers of Whistler face regarding mental health, such as employees suffering from depression and anxiety, especially in the context of the ongoing global COVID-19 pandemic. Community education in mental health leads to awareness, which in turn leads to a better understanding, which promotes compassion and the proper support for those suffering from mental illness and their families. In other words, stigma is erased.

In 2020 and 2021, we adapted the course and all programs to be delivered online via Zoom. By moving our programs online, we increased accessibility for all service users, and particularly, for the safely of our staff and volunteers, and those most at risk due to Covid-19. This has meant we have recruited more volunteers and dedicated more staff time to supporting our service users in a technical capacity.

The funds will be spent on helping Pathways SMIS deliver the above programs and towards salaries of staff working on delivering these programs.

In order for the aforementioned to occur, Pathways SMIS would be working in partnership with service providers, medical support services, and the RCMP through building a volunteer base of local family support and peer mentors. Programs supported would include online public lectures, information sharing, online lectures by mental health experts, employer/employee education, online local family support groups, online community outreach such as support groups and online one-to-one support. As the adage goes: "It takes a village to raise a child"; we at Pathways SMIS believe it takes a COMMUNITY to support families who have a loved one with a mental illness, or others, such as an employer who has an employee struggling with a mental illness.

No, it is an existing program but we have made adaptations to the program to enable us to deliver them online due to Covid-19. Moving to delivering our program Online has made them more accessible to the community up in Whistler and Sea-to-Sky. We have seen an increase in the uptake of our programs and services in the area. We would like to continue building on this success, make improvements with the new changes we have made and work to expand the program given the increase in demand. Furthermore, we are responding to this demand by offering educational workshops ontop of the family-to-family course we provide. These ill be more frequent, a shorter time commitment and will provide additional, more in-depth education on topics covered in our 8-week course. We hope this will help families in a more timely manner and will help us address the increased demand of our services,

Pathways adapted the Family-to-Family course to be delivered online via Zoom due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We saw an increase in demand for this course; from 97 people who graduated in 2020 to 121 people who graduated in 2021. By moving our programs online, we increased accessibility for all service users, especially people living in more remote regions. We also offered technical support and guidance to people who needed help accessing our programs since they moved online.

Our Awareness and Early Intervention program reduce stigma and discrimination experienced by those struggling with a family member living with a mental illness. The program facilitates their acceptance by the community which in turn has a positive effect on mental health. Our centre provides support through: one-to-one support (our Family Navigator helps connect people to the information and services they need), one-to-one peer-support and support group sessions facilitated by family member volunteers who deliver the peer-to-peer sessions online.

A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT



After this extraordinary and trying year, I hope this letter finds you and your loved ones safe and well. I write this annual report sharing some of the activities and successes of Pathways' past season.

We are excited to welcome the Honourable Sheila Malcolmson, our key speaker at Pathways' 2021 AGM. Sheila Malcolmson has recently been appointed as the Minister of Mental Health and Addictions of British Columbia and is also the Vice-Chair of the Cabinet Working Group on Mental Health, Addictions and Homelessness and a member of the Cabinet Committee on Social Initiatives.

Firstly, I'd like to say a special thanks to those who have renewed their membership and continued to support us during a year that has been difficult for us all. The COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting economic recession have had a profound and negative effect on many people's mental health and has created new barriers for people already suffering from mental illness. Your generosity has been of paramount importance in uplifting those struggling with a loved one with mental illness at a time when they have needed it most. Not surprisingly, the pandemic has also negatively impacted both our membership and donations; your continued support has meant a great deal to us. Thank you.

It goes without saying that the dedication of our volunteers and staff has never been more apparent than this year. I extend my deepest gratitude and sincere thanks to all of those who have pulled out all the stops and gone the extra mile to learn new ways of doing things to ensure that our programs and services continue despite the significant restrictions in place due to COVID-19. Pathways' peer-to-peer model is only possible with our volunteers continued support of helping us deliver our programs.

Thanks in particular to our staff: Pouneh Jula, Valeska Gauthier, and Kaitlin Bustos for their work in organizing and delivering Pathways' programs and fundraising. I would also like to thank Nancy Ford for stepping back into her previous role of Executive Director and supporting Pathways through a very challenging period in 2020. In addition, I would like to thank Pathways' Board of Directors who have given their unlimited time and leadership in helping Pathways achieve its goals.

I am pleased to welcome Emma Chapman as Pathways' new Executive Director, who joined us in the fall of 2020. I am also pleased to welcome Amy Collis, Pathways' Project & Communications Coordinator who has just joined us this past February.

Pathways has seen another successful year of program delivery, development and advocating for families affected by serious mental illness. We met the unprecedented demand for our services amid COVID-19 by broadening and adapting our programs and services.

Your donations give your communities the following services:

- **1. Peer Support:** This gives one-on-one peer support to family members, significant others and friends of a loved one dealing with a mental illness, often in crisis situations with information and support in accessing one-on-one essential treatment for their loved one.
- **2. Family-to-Family Program:** This is an eight-week evidence-based mental health course that covers all aspects of mental illness. It is taught by trained peer instructors primarily in North & West Vancouver, Vancouver, Tri Cities, Sunshine Coast, Squamish and Whistler. Due to increased demand and the shift to an online format, the course is now available to those who need it across B.C.
- **3. Advocacy:** We advocate for care, compassion and respect for those suffering from mental illness. We advocate on behalf of individuals with mental illness and their families, and especially those who have been lost in the system.
- **4. Education:** We organize in person presentations delivered by a person living with an illness and their family member. These presentations are to schools, workplaces, police departments, professionals, service clubs and those who work with the public. We aim to break down the barriers, myths and fears that surround mental illness, and encourage those who see someone showing symptoms to act quickly.

We are, and will remain, a volunteer-led society with a mission of families helping families - those who are coping with ALL serious mental illnesses suffered by loved ones. I cannot thank the membership, volunteers, sponsors, and individual donors enough, for all your continued dedication, monetary support, and generosity during this extraordinary year. Your support transforms the lives of those who care for a loved one living with mental illness, restores their hope and paves their way to a brighter future.

ABOUT US





Established in 1983 as a branch of the BC Schizophrenia Society, **Pathways Serious Mental Illness Society** (SMIS) provides programs and services to families with loved ones living with serious mental illnesses. Pathways serves all communities with a larger focus on the North Shore, Vancouver, the Tri-Cities and Sea-to-Sky area.

We are on a **mission** to **alleviate the suffering** caused by serious mental illnesses including anxiety disorders, bipolar disorder, borderline personality disorder, concurrent disorders, depression and schizophrenia.

Our **vision** is to be a vibrant, innovative centre of **support**, **education**, **awareness** and **advocacy** for families and others affected by serious mental Illness.

PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Education, **support** and **advocacy** are the three important pillars at Pathways SMIS. The pillars work together to facilitate learning, understanding and empathy while addressing the important topics and discussions surrounding serious mental illness

Family-To-Family

In 2020, **11 volunteer teachers** and **5 producers** dedicated a cumulative total of **1855 hours** to the Family-to-Family course provided **online** in **four regions**: North Shore, Tri-Cities, Vancouver and Sunshine Coast. A total number of **97** individuals participated in the mental health course.

North Shore Tri-Cities Sunshine Coast Vancouver **The Family-to-Family 8-week education** course is offered **twice** a year to families, significant others, friends and relatives of a loved one living with mental illness. Two family-member volunteers trained by **National Alliance on Mental Illness** (NAMI), who are graduates of the course, use a team approach to teach the program.

The **free** course covers a range of topics including serious mental illness and its treatment, practical skills such as problem solving, effective communication and guidance on supporting a loved one with mental illness.

The course was developed by the NAMI in the United States and is licensed and adapted for use in British Columbia.

Due to COVID-19 we had to pivot and adapt our classes to an online format in the middle of offering our course.

Althought this was a challenging learning experience, it allowed Pathways to serve families in need from areas, that under normal circumstances, would not be able to attend our classes. In turn, targeting a larger audience makes our impact that much greater.

To the delight of many, the online format felt just as intimate and supportive as if the classes were taught in person.

NAMI changed their regular 12-week Family to Family course to an 8-week course, and our dedicated volunteers Canadianized the content to ensure the relevance to all. The updated material includes the newest information on mental illness, strategies to cope and communicate and much more.

School Presentations: First Hand Stories

School presentations, also known as First-Hand Stories, tells the **story of mental illness** in a moving and direct way. It is one of the Society's **most important** educational programs. By educating the students about mental illness, we are hoping that it will decrease the stigma and increase the compassion for others.

First-Hand Stories consists of a **panel** of two guest speakers – a person with a psychiatric diagnosis and a family member. The guests are presented as a team and each describes his or her own **personal experience with mental illness along with a PowerPoint presentation educating the students about mental illness**.

First-Hand Stories is a **unique** and **powerful** storytelling model which helps students and people in the community **understand the nature and prevalence** of serious mental illness.



Following the Covid-19 outbreak School Presentations were postponed.

Workshops & Public Education Lecture Series

The Workshops and Public Education Lecture Series gives families, significant others, friends and relatives of a loved one living with mental illness. Professionals as well as the general public, an opportunity to ask questions and receive answers directly from experts and service providers.

In 2020, a total of **289 attendees** attended **two workshops** and **four online lectures**.

At Pathways, 600 families, significant others, friends and relatives of a loved one living with mental illness accessed monthly peersupport groups and one-on-one peer-support. The programs offer our communities an opportunity to express and share their experiences in a confidential, secure and supportive space.

Monthly Support Group

In 2020, a cumulative total of 103 hours was dedicated to running 40 support group sessions.




One-on-One Support


Our **One-on-One Support Program** has provided members with information and support regarding serious mental illness over the phone at Pathways SMIS. These calls came from **14 cities** within **3 provinces**.

ADVOCACY

As an **advocacy centre** for communities affected by serious mental illness, Pathways SMIS helps families **overcome obstacles** that are thrown in their way. The Society's four pillars of advocacy include: **Proactive Treatment, Family involvement, Information Sharing**, and **Legislation & Government**.

Proactive Treatment

Pathways advocates for timely treatment of those with serious mental illness. We help families overcome obstacles that are thrown in their way. We particularly fight for involuntary committal where appropriate, so that a person suffering from psychosis, with no insight into his or her own condition and hence spurning treatment, will nevertheless get the help that they need and be freed from the grip of their illness.

Family Involvement

Families can play a crucial role in the treatment process and in helping their ill relatives get better and stay better, although this isn't always recognized by professionals. Pathways advocates for family involvement and explains to family members how to ensure that their participation will be accepted.

Information Sharing

Pathways encourages professionals to share information with family members and also instructs family members on what the law and "best practices" are on the matter. We explain to family members the importance of insisting they be kept fully in the picture by professionals and give them support to follow through when necessary

Whose Rights are Right?

Bonnie Sauder is a member of Pathways SMIS Advocacy Committee. Here is her story:

My son was 17-years-old when he attempted suicide. Someone phoned me that day to tell me. A friend of his? A police officer? Someone from the hospital? You would think I'd have that seared into my mind, but I don't. What I do remember was that feeling I think mothers everywhere would understand. My heart seemed to leap into my throat and started pounding in my ears. I was instantly cold and sweaty at the same time. I tried to make sense of what I'd just heard from the voice on the other end of the line but only picked out, "He's okay...safe...hospital."

I don't remember the drive there, but I do recall the surrealness of paying for my parking and trying to figure out which part of the hospital that I needed to go to. I'd forgotten to ask. I suddenly found myself moving through the sliding doors of the Emergency Room. Once inside, I saw a few people in uniforms, probably paramedics, standing around chatting to one another. None of them seemed to notice me. I didn't know where to go so I walked straight ahead and waited in front of a person seated at a computer behind some glass.

When she looked up she said, "Have you seen the triage nurse?"

Triage? I didn't know what that meant. I shook my head and said, "I got a call that my son is here. Can you tell me where I can find him?"

"Who called you?" she asked.

"I'm not sure." I lowered my voice and moved closer to the window, "He was found on the bridge and brought in."








Any funding received from the CEP granting program would go to

- 1. Honorariums for the music director and accompanist. Our music director devotes much time and effort to improving the choir. Membership dropped during covid but we have rebounded to 41 members this year and anticipate more people joining post-pandemic.
- 2. The choir would benefit from new choral risers for performances. Our risers are over 30 years old and while they have served us well they are tired, rusty, and pose a fall risk to members as there is no back rail on the highest riser. A quote from Canadell Staging, the only Canadian supplier of choral risers, is included in the supporting documents. The quote includes a back rail that would keep members safe on the top platform while performing. Whistler Singers Choir was fortunate to receive a grant in the spring of 2021 from the Real Estate Association of Whistler (REAW) to purchase 2 risers with backrails, however the choir needs an additional 2 risers to fit 40+ members for performances.

- 1. Honorariums are not a new activity
- 2. Choral risers are a new expense and would allow the choir to look professional, and to perform safely. The Whistler Singers goal is to purchase 2 risers with back rails this year.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

The Whistler Singers participated in the Remembrance Day Ceremony for locals and visitors where several hundred people were in attendance. The choir performed in concert for the first time in 2 years on Dec 12, 2021. The choir also sang carols through the main village and Creekside village 5 times during the Christmas season to bring holiday cheer to all within earshot. The 39th Christmas Eve and Carol Service was pre-recorded and streamed online for a second year due to covid restrictions. We look forward to performing a spring concert April 24, 2022

- 1. The Whistler Singers Choir has limited ways to raise funds. We charge our members annual dues of \$60 for half year membership and \$100 full year. We keep the membership fee low so that all who want to participate can do so. Many members return yearly, but we have new members, often seasonal workers, who join the choir to get a sense of belonging to the community. This year we have new members who have moved from Australia, England, Germany and Chile. As a small grass-roots organization we aim to keep our expenses as low as possible, while compensating the music director and accompanist for their considerable efforts that prepare us to perform.

The choir normally gets revenue in the form of cash donations at our concerts, but we have been unable to hold 3 of 4 scheduled concerts over the last 2 years due to covid19. The choir normally has opportunities to participate in other activities to receive honorariums (like the Con Brio Music Festival & Bizarre Bazaar Holiday Market) but these events have also been cancelled due to covid restrictions.

We did receive remuneration from Tourism Whistler for caroling during this past Christmas season.

Covid19 is still affecting the ability of the choir to raise funds. Most of our performance activities were cancelled during the last 2 years, putting the choir in a downward financial position. When restrictions are lifted, the Whistler Singers will be ready to sing for the community once more. Grant monies would ensure the choir can plan for future performances where all members would standing comfortably and safely. Two additional choral risers would provide enough space for 40+ members and they would be used for many years to come.

Due to covid19 restrictions the choir must wear singing masks and social distance during our indoor weekly practices. Special medical grade singing masks are an added expense of about \$325 this year, and renting a larger space at MPCS has cost us an extra \$1100 as well this year. While rent for RMOW facilities is not to be included in grant monies, we respectfully ask that you consider our increased costs and grant the Whistler Singers Community Choir as much funds as possible.

The purpose of this grant funding is to improve our organisation's impact in two key areas: 1) reduce the organisations environmental footprint; and 2) support the arts and culture sector in Whistler.

Specifically, the organisation is requesting funding for the following activities:

- 1. Partner with AWARE Whistler to bring their Zero Waste Hero's program to the Whistler Farmers Markets. AWARE hosts a station at the market location where customer waste is directed into the correct stream (e.g. landfill, compostable, recyclable etc.) and disposed of appropriately. There is an educational component where the community can engage with AWARE staff. AWARE also work with our members/vendors to educate them and help them make environmentally friendly choices for packaging. The cost to the Whistler Farmers' Market for this function is \$2,000 annually. This is a subsidised rate with existing support from the RMOW.
- 2. Implement an entertainment program for the season, allowing Whistler's entertainers the opportunity to perform on market days and be reimbursed for their talent and time. The Whistler Farmers' Market is known as a place where community and guests can not only access essential items such as produce and other food items, but also connect with community and vendors in a welcoming and vibrant environment. Covid-19 forced on-site entertainment at the market to cease, as a result of both gathering restrictions and a lack of budget to implement an entertainment/animation program. In 2022, the organisation wishes to revive entertainment at the market, hosting two entertainers per market, across 25 market dates. This program will prioritise working with Whistler performers, allowing them the opportunity for exposure and income, while strengthening Whistler's arts and culture scene. This will also enrich the customer experience at the market, and encourage customers to spend more time at the market connecting with others and supporting vendors. Program budget: \$10,000 (breakdown \$200 per performer, two performers per market, total of 25 markets).

Note that the global pandemic forced the market to relocate in 2020 and 2021 which resulted in a significant reduction in space and vendor revenues. While we are working on securing our 2022 location, the working budget for 2022 does not currently allow for the above activities to take place.

Partnering with AWARE and local entertainers is not a new activity for the Whistler Farmers' Market, however the financial challenges associated with the global pandemic have not allowed these items to be a priority in 2020 and 2021. For 2022, these are two items we believe are necessary as we look to strengthen and grow our organisation back to pre-pandemic levels.

Goal: Have AWARE Whistler attend every market in the 2022 season to:

- Minimise environmental footprint of the Whistler Farmers ' Market
- Educate vendors and customers to reduce their personal waste

Goal: Host a schedule of 50 performances by local entertainers in the 2022 season to:

- Support and showcase Whistler's art and culture scene
- Increase animation at the market to in turn increase customer attendance and satisfaction

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

- The WFM hosts markets from May to October, allowing access for the community and visitors to essential items such as produce and food, while also creating a vibrant space for enjoyment. Just as importantly, the market serves as a space for local farmers, producers and creatives to sell their items and make an income. It is estimated that the WFM will be able to work with up to 100 vendors in the 2022 season and host up to 60 vendors weekly. 2021 data shows average customer attendance of 2,400 people weekly (not including infants and small kids).

- WFM works closely with the Whistler Community Services Society and the BC Association of Farmers' Markets (BCAFM) to support fort security. An average of \$11K (annually) worth of fresh produce reaches community members in need via the BCAFM's Farmers Market Nutrition Coupon Program. WFM also contributes with \$2K worth of coupons to this program. Additionally, the Whistler Food Bank collects and distributes produce weekly.

- WFM provides employement opportunities via: participation in the Canada Summer Jobs Program providing employment opportunities for youth, hiring 1-2 additional employees during market season and welcoming volunteers into the organisation.

Grant applications have been submitted for the following programs in 2022 and WFM is awaiting the results of these applications:

- 2. BC Farmers' Market Expansion Program this is a one-time grant opportunity funded by the Canadian Agricultural Partnership, a federal-provincial-territorial initiative. The grant is designed to support and strengthen farmers' markets across BC and funding is provided for operational items such as equipment (e.g. tents, trailers). WFM requested \$10,000 of funding, primarily to put towards obtaining a cargo trailer for storing and transporting market equipment.


