Mr. Hothersall said that he noted a number of places that are residentially zoned are being listed for nightly rental online, and is concerned that employees are being evicted for the winter in favour of nightly rental revenues. He asked if Council will take this matter seriously when it comes to imposing fines, especially with the new bylaws in place.

Mayor N. Wilhelm-Morden responded that Council and staff are indeed taking this seriously and noted there had been several examples of some owners being fined or taken to court. She noted that the Bylaw Department is working on a complaints basis. Mayor N. Wilhelm-Morden suggested that any person who is being evicted due to their accommodation being offered illegally for nightly rentals should make a complaint for Bylaw to deal with.

Mr. Hothersall asked if priority would be given to complaints about accommodation where employees are being displaced.

Mayor N. Wilhelm-Morden responded that this would be the case.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor's Report

UBCM Summary

Last week, Whistler hosted the Union of BC Municipalities' annual convention. The convention is an opportunity for Whistler to engage other communities and meet with provincial ministers on issues of importance to the community. It was a very busy agenda. During the conference, Chief Administrative Officer Mike Furey, Councillors and Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden met with the following provincial ministers:

- Lisa Beare, Minister of Tourism;
- George Heyman, Minister of Environment;
- Claire Trevena, Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure;
- Katrine Conroy, Minister of Child and Family Development;
- Doug Donaldson, Minister of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development;
- Katrina Chen, Minister of State for Child Care;
- Adrian Dix, Minister for Health;
- Selina Robinson, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing; and

- Carole James, Minister of Finance.

The meetings were productive and the ministers were made aware of Whistler's current challenges. These meetings were also an opportunity to help the Resort Municipality of Whistler build support for funding and to move plans forward on key items, including:

- Sea to Sky regional transit;
- Housing, including funding support for the lower Cheakamus Crossing project;
- Attracting more early childhood educators to Whistler;
- Multi-year wildfire funding allowing the acquisition of required equipment for wildfire mitigation and management; and
- Increased access to mental health services and family physicians.

Chief Administrative Officer Mike Furey and Squamish Nation Councillor Chris Lewis also sat on a panel on advancing local government relations with Indigenous peoples. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden attended the Mayors' Caucus. Meetings were also held with ministers and fellow resort municipality's leaders about the Resort Municipality Initiative (RMI) funding. RMI funding was confirmed as ongoing with further information coming out in the 2019 provincial budget.

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden noted that she had received positive feedback about Whistler as the host community and added that the attendees had enjoyed their time here. Attendees noted Whistler's renowned facilities and in the spirit of the conference's theme of connection, credited the intimacy of the Village in providing more opportunities to interact with other attendees.

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden thanked Tourism Whistler and the Conference Centre team for their excellent conference services and banquet delivery, and also thanked the Hilton, Westin and the other hotels, as well as the community for again being very welcoming hosts.

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden invited the Councillors to share some of their highlights and take-aways from the UBCM Conference.

Councillor Jack Crompton

Councillor Jack Crompton noted that he was impressed with the level of attendance given that it is so close to the municipal elections. One workshop that stood out was about engaging millennials in politics. One of the key take-aways was that children who are engaged in actual democracy rather than pretend democracy are more likely to be voters, candidates and participate moving forward. Examples were children could view meetings at school, shadow councils and youth councils.

Councillor Jack Crompton also noted that there many conversations about wildfire considering the last two years, with our local perspective showing the need for inclusion of the local governments in the decisions that are made. He also noted some great conversations around agriculture and new rules that are coming out relating the Agricultural Land Commission can better serve communities such as Whistler.

Councillor Jen Ford

Councillor Jen Ford noted that she had attended many of the same workshops mentioned by Councillor Crompton. One workshop that stood out was on Green Technology and Innovation and how we can work towards meeting our targets for climate change mitigation. It was well received and looked at things such as renewable energy and renewable gases. Councillor Jen Ford also noted that she had attended several meetings with the ministers for Childcare and Child and Family Development and they announced some new funding for childcare fee reductions, affordable childcare benefits for families that need it the most. This allows parents to go back to work, which is so important for our

community. They also announced programming and funding for bringing more people into working in Early Childhood Education, which will help with the staffing shortages that are currently being experienced. Their target is to open 22,000 more spaces for childcare in the next three years. Councillor Jen Ford also noted that she had attended sessions regarding agricultural land reserve and protecting farmland and food reserve and agriculture in our region.

Councillor Jen Ford announced that she had also been elected to the Board of UBCM as Director at Large.

Councillor John Grills

Councillor John Grills noted that there are often many meetings packed into the day, and congratulated Councillor Jen Ford who had to run straight from another meeting in order to give her speech for the UBCM director at Large election.

Councillor John Grills thanked the food and beverage staff working in all the different locations and noted seeing many of the same staff working across the various locations.

Councillor John Grills noted that he was impressed that the ministers had strong knowledge about Whistler, for example, they were aware of the recent water main break; and noted that they were complimentary about employee housing and FireSmart initiatives in Whistler. He noted that the RMI and MRDT meetings went well. Councillor John Grills also met with Mr. Ramsay from the BC Housing Corporation and he asked for staff to follow up with him with regards to Cheakamus Crossing Phase 2.

Councillor John Grills noted that they spoke to Airbnb on a number of occasions. As of October 1, 2018, they will be collecting MRDT when people book online.

With regards to cannabis tax sharing, there was no word on when this would happen, but UBCM passed a resolution which provides the province with some good suggestions.

Councillor Cathy Jewett

Councillor Cathy Jewett echoed the sentiments of her colleagues with regards to the hospitality in Whistler and specifically noted the Village Hosts were great at helping delegates find their way around. Councillor Cathy Jewett also thanked her colleagues on Council for making sure that between them they were all able to attend as many workshops as possible.

Councillor Cathy Jewett attended a workshop on affordability highlighting issues that are affecting municipalities across the province. Another workshop was regarding building community resiliency to wildfires noting the state of emergency in B.C. this summer. There were also concerns that we are going from flooding to wildfires. Councillor Cathy Jewett noted that she attended a forum on 'tent cities', but for Whistler we are seeing more people in vans. She also noted that she attended meetings on the Childcare Benefit roll out and Cannabis legislation, as well as an event at the Library for the B.C. Libraries Trust Association.

Councillor Cathy Jewett specifically noted the Indigenous Relations workshop which provided insight on recognizing how First Nations prefer to create dialogue.

Councillor Sue Maxwell

Councillor Sue Maxwell again echoed the comments from other Councillors and agreed it was a great session to be at this year.

Councillor Sue Maxwell noted that she attended a workshops on: Green Innovation and Clean Growth, where they noted that procurement could be a key way to drive this; a Midsize Community Workshop – many communities with a population under 20,000 participated in a count of homeless people in 2018, and the solutions that have been found

to help overcome this; Mental Health and Opioid Addiction – the phrase that stood out was “the opposite of addiction is connection”; Code of Conduct – where it was suggested that there was importance in implementing a code of conduct.

Councillor Sue Maxwell listed a number of notable resolutions that were passed.

Calgary Olympic Bid

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden noted that Calgary is bidding to host the 2026 Olympic Winter Games and their bid proposes the use of Whistler Olympic Park. The RMOW has been aware of the proposed concept since early this year. The International Olympic Committee has revamped the process to make bidding and hosting Olympic Games cheaper and more sustainable by sharing venues and infrastructure that already exist in other locations. Hosting the ski jumping and Nordic-combined in Whistler Olympic Park is a way to utilize existing infrastructure, reduce costs and be more sustainable, Whistler supports this approach in principle. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden stated that the details of the bid have not been formally presented to Council at this point and as far as she is aware they have not yet been presented to the SLRD board (which is the jurisdiction where the sport hosting would take place). The Resort Municipality of Whistler anticipates seeing a presentation later this year if the plebiscite in Calgary in November gives the project the green light to move forward. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden noted that nothing has been considered yet by Council, and added that the community’s views will be important moving forward, and there will continue to be updates.

CKNW Show

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden noted that she had co-hosted the radio show on the station CKNW on September 5, 2018 and it was a great opportunity to talk about Whistler.

Cheakamus Crossing Phase II Open House, October 1, 2018

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden announced that there will be an open house regarding Cheakamus Crossing Housing Phase II. The open house has been scheduled for Monday, October 1, 2018 from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. at the Westin Resort & Spa. It will provide an opportunity for the community to view the progress on Phase II of the master plan and the development of additional employee-restricted housing at Cheakamus Crossing. Additional information will be provided in the next week at whistler.ca.

Fall Transportation Changes

The end of summer marks changes to Whistler’s transportation program. Council has just heard from the Transportation Advisory Group (TAG) about the 2028 Transportation Action Plan, and Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden added that there was a Transportation Open House prior to the Council Meeting and the final results will be seen at the Council Meeting on October 2, 2018. She noted that over the past two years, the TAG and the community have taken big steps to improve transportation in Whistler. Some of these are in the form of the summer transportation initiatives like adding additional transit services and free weekend travel. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden commended this group, as well as the community supporting these initiatives.

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden reminded everyone that the summer services have changed as we move into fall and the free weekend travel on Whistler’s buses has now ended. This program was funded by pay parking in the Day Lots and was a great success again this year. The Farmers’ Market free bike valet service has also finished for the season and there is free parking in Day Lots 4 and 5 from September 16 to December 15, 2018.

Significant Closures to Alpine Trails Following Grizzly Bear Encounters

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden reminded the community of the significant alpine trail closures following three grizzly bear encounters. The Resort Municipality of Whistler is working with the Conservation Officer Service (COS) and area biologists to support the

extensive closure of trails on Mount Sproatt and Rainbow Mountain. Whistler shares these mountains with Whistler's grizzly and black bear populations, and Council and the RMOW appreciate the community's ongoing care towards bears. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden added she is aware that the community has many avid hikers and bikers, and has a degree of familiarity with bears but asked that everyone respect these trail closures to ensure the bears and people are safe. The COS have reminded us that grizzly bears are extremely sensitive to human presence. Even if you don't see them, they can detect people from kilometres away and when they do they alter their behaviour. This puts increased pressure on these bears, and complicates efforts to gain enough weight prior to denning. The closures are also important to reduce the likelihood of injury or death due to a conflict with agitated grizzly bears. The closed trails are the entire Sproatt Alpine Network, Rainbow Lake Trail, Skywalk, Kevin's Homerun Trail, Screaming Cat Lake Trail and Upper Nineteen-Mile Creek Trail. Further details can be found on the website at whistler.ca/bearalerts. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden thanked the community for their help in protecting Whistler's bears by avoiding these trails.

RMOW Recognized for Achieving Carbon Neutrality

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden announced that the Resort Municipality of Whistler was proud to achieve carbon neutrality again in 2017. This was recognized last week by the Province and UBCM with the RMOW being awarded Level 4 recognition from the Climate Action Recognition Program. Whistler signed the Climate Action Charter in 2007 and has been committed to taking action on climate change and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. The RMOW looks to lead by example by reducing both corporate emissions and emissions from the broader community. The RMOW corporate operations have achieved carbon neutrality annual since 2010. Corporate greenhouse gas emissions have reduced by 29 per cent since peak levels in 2009. Work continues with staff actively seeking opportunities to reduce energy consumption and greenhouse gas emissions across operations. Meadow Park Sports Centre Hosts the Canucks and Pool Reopening

This weekend, Whistler was delighted to welcome back the Vancouver Canucks for their annual training camp. The training camp was hosted at Meadow Park Sports Centre and the Canucks trained over four days with sessions open for the public to watch for free. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden added that it was great to see hockey fans coming out to cheer on the players.

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden noted that the Meadow Park Sports Centre has now completed their annual maintenance work. The pool has reopened for all swim classes and public access, and she thanked the community for their patience during this time.

Local Government Elections

Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden noted that nominations for Council have now closed and she congratulated Councillor Crompton as he will become the next Mayor of Whistler. Mayor Nancy Wilhelm-Morden also wished Councillors Jen Ford, Cathy Jewett and John Grills luck in their campaigns.

District Energy
Systems
Update

An update was given regarding the District Energy Systems. The following resolution was made at the Closed Council Meeting of September 18, 2018:

That Council transfer \$870,000 to Whistler2020 Development Corporation ("WDC") for funding of repairs and maintenance of the home heating systems in the 174 homes constructed by WDC; and

That Council require that these funds be distributed to the five strata corporations in proportion to number of units in each strata as follows:

- The Heights \$135,000
- The Rise \$300,000
- Riverbend \$100,000
- The Terrace \$135,000
- Whitewater \$200,000; and

That Council require the strata corporations of the five WDC constructed strata properties to develop guidelines in collaboration with property management companies and RMOW staff that will determine how the funds can be accessed. To receive the funds, each strata corporation will need to bring forward fund administration guidelines as well as a release from each homeowner in their strata that indemnifies the WDC and the RMOW from future liability with respect to the home heating systems; and further,

That Council require the guidelines for funding to include, among other things, how the funds will be prioritized, a maximum amount per property, annual reporting on expenditures, and assurances that work will be carried out by qualified professionals.
