Sea-to-Sky Climate Change Symposium - Plan On A Page

Background:

The RMOW Community Energy and Climate Action Plan assigns an action for AWARE to: 'Increase collaboration with neighbouring S2S communities and the SLRD on climate-related issues'. The United Nations also recognises the need for collaboration and dialogue in it's Climate Action targets under the UN Goals for Sustainable Development, highlighting the need to: 'Improve education, awareness-raising and human and institutional capacity on climate change mitigation, adaptation, impact reduction and early warning systems'.

The Sea-to-Sky has a great diversity of economic drivers, ecosystems, and lifestyles. This diversity provides both opportunities, and challenges, for local governments, non-governmental organizations, businesses and community champions who are seeking to increase the resilience of our communities in the context of climate change. 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Building on years of zero waste initiatives in the Sea to Sky, AWARE would like to apply for the following grant funding through the 2018 CEP:

1. Zero Waste Education Tent: The Zero Waste Heroes program is an social enterprise model that provides 1000's of event attendees with the opportunity to keep waste out of the landfill each year by providing collection points for waste and opportunities for education. As this program expands, so does our opportunity to connect with more individuals. We are seeking support to create an interactive experience beyond the zero waste station, where community members, young and old, can learn more about zero waste from display banners, touch tables and interactive games. This memorable experience will help clear confusion around trouble waste items, explain the benefits of a zero waste lifestyle and inspire action.

2. Zero Waste Workshops: A zero waste lifestyle connects people with non-toxic products, while leaving the packaging behind. Protecting the Environment:

1) Because people only care FOR what they first care ABOUT. Through nature educating we help people care ABOUT it and in turn those people are much more likely to become stewards of the environment.

2) Because to make good environmental management planning decisions, you need good data. All our programs have a hard science component where leading scientists in BC contribute. This unbiased data is invaluable when making environmental management planning decisions, e.g., it has been incorporated into two recent reports: (i) RMOW Species and Ecosystems at Risk; and (ii) Species and Habitat Priorities for Biodiversity Conservation in the RMOW.

Enriching Community Life:

1) Because our community loves to learn and through our programs we give the community access to learning opportunities. Our school program gives students an opportunity to learn from some of BC's best biologists

The Whistler Multicultural Network

The Whistler Multicultural Network (WMN) welcomes and supports newcomers, celebrating their skills and cultures, so that immigrants are empowered and enabled to participate more widely and sustainably in our Community. We aim to build a greater understanding and recognition of the skills and values immigrants bring to Whistler and to promote diversity through volunteer-led cultural sharing, training, and education. In 2018, we will organise the sixth annual Whistler Multicultural Festival.

The Whistler Multicultural Network was formed in April 2012 by the Whistler group of the Welcome Sea to Sky project, funded by the SMART Fund, Vancouver Coastal Health, which aims at improving health outcomes in immigrants living and working in the Sea to Sky corridor by developing life and communication skills, knowledge, mentoring and leadership capacity in this population. The WMN is a key partner in the Whistler Welcome Centre, and collaborates with the Whistler Public Library, Capilano University and Sea to Sky Community Services to deliver federally- and provincially-funded immigrant settlement services, and language and literacy programming. The Welcome Centre and WMN outreach programs are staffed collaboratively by Capilano University, Community Development & Outreach, and Sea to Sky Community Services (SSCS).

Sea to Sky Community Services is a registered society (S14102) and a charity (Charitable business number 119161107 RR0001). Sea to Sky Community Services would be the receiving agency for this grant and would be accountable for reporting back to the RMOW on how this grant was spent.

Multicultural Community Kitchen program 2018-19

The Multicultural Community Kitchen program is facilitated by immigrants and an immigrant advisory committee. It offers open sessions to community members in order to build community connections, intercultural understanding and to promote a sense of belonging to the community.

In 2018, we plan to continue delivery of open sessions, multicultural food at the annual Multicultural Festival, and immigrant training/development (Foodsafe/First Aid/nutrition and food photography workshops). Additionally, we plan to develop tools for wider awareness building and understanding of the immigrant communities in Whistler; specially, we aim to better promote our multicultural recipe book published last year in December. This will be further developed to create ongoing content for the WMN website and blog, and local media uptake to circulate these regular issues more widely will be sought. A video showcasing these immigrant populations, their food and cultures, based on the program activities will also be produced.

All programs are offered for free on a drop-in basis, providing low barrier health and wellness opportunities for all women, including those who may require additional support to mitigate the effects of violence and abuse.

The HSWC receives funding for 9 hours a week from the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General for both communities. To maintain a 0 waitlist the program has been operating at 15 hours per week up until October 2017 at which time the HSWC made the decision to fund an additional 8 hours, from our Social Enterprise, to meet the growing needs of the two communities. With the funds from the Community Enrichment grant and from our Social Enterprise we can continue to offer 23 hours per week in order maintain a 0 waitlist and to effectively meet the needs of the children, youth and families within Whistler and Pemberton.

Last year (2017), the PEACE Program in Whistler/Pemberton supported 61 children and youth through individual counselling, support groups and camps and 16 parents/caregivers through parent support. Through the PEACE program, children and youth learn how to identify hard to handle feelings and how to express them in healthy ways, recognize their strengths and increase their self-confidence and self-esteem. They learn effective problem solving and coping skills, how to define and protect boundaries, how to keep themselves safe and to identify safe and supportive people in their life, and better understand the concept of healthy relationships. Most importantly, children are provided with a safe, supportive, nurturing environment to deal with traumatic events in their lives, learn that they are not alone and not at fault for the conflict/abuse in their lives. 

The Whistler Waldorf School (WWS	respectfully requests funding in the amount of \$5959.77 for the purpose of increasing the quality of our group child care facility.	

The Whistler Waldorf School holds a Group Child Care license to offer child minding to children 30 months to school age. We are licensed to care for up to 14 children

per day. With enrollment of 6-8 children per day, our program is currently under utilized. Recognizing that childcare is in demand in Whistler with walt lists at other facilities, we have conducted an internal review of our program with the goal of making it more attractive and accessible to local families. Based on key informant interviews and a review of current demographic information, we have identified that cost, hours of operation and facilities are current barriers to enrollment.

We are currently taking active measures to mitigate identified barriers. Our Board of Trustees will review our current fee structure in coming months and we are planning on expanding our hours of operation in September 2018 to better meet the needs of working families. In addition, we are seeking funding from both the Community Foundation of Whistler to support outreach and marketing efforts as well as the Ministry of Children and Family Development to support required upgrades to play yard fence and gate.

We request the support of the Resort Municipality of Whistler in helping us address some of the facilities work that needs to be undertaken to increase the quality of our indoor learning environment.

Specifically, funds will be used to cover the cost of minor renovations to our group child care facility including materials and labor as well as the purchase of new furnishings.

Facility upgrades include: 1) Interior mill work (trim, panelling) and painting and 2) Furnishings: addition of storage cabinets, a new rug, and new rest mats.

We aim to enhance an existing group child care program. The building that we currently use for our child care program is a portable structure that is now more than 20 years old. It is in need of renovation. Unfortunately, capital renovations would require re-allocation of resources from our operating budget which would negatively affect other programming.

Having a provincially certified Waldorf school in Whistler greatly enriches community life by providing quality programming and a choice in educational options for the residents of Whistler, allowing more families access to the education they desire within our community. Having different models of education in the resort community broadens learning opportunities for the community and opens doors for families from other communities to consider Whistler as a place to relocate. In 2017-18, five families moved to Whistler specifically to attend our school. We currently have an additional 21 inquiries for September 2018 enrolment and 66% of these inquiries are from outside the Sea-to-Sky corridor.

Supporting the Whistler Waldorf School Group Child Care Program helps ensure that the early learning needs of more children in our community are met. The availability of high-quality childcare strengthens local families and contributes to the creation of a strong social fabric in our community.

This grant addresses the CPI: Ensuring Economic Viability

Through the provision of this grant, WWS aims to increase enrolment in its Group Child Care Program. Across Canada and across the income spectrum, families are negatively impacted by the cost of child care and a lack of available childcare spaces. Inaccessible and unaffordable childcare keeps parents out of the workforce and prevents families from saving money and planning for the future. The presence of accessible childcare is shown to stimulate economic growth by increasing participation in the workforce and therefore spending and tax revenue.¹

In addition, WWS employs 36 faculty and staff, creating and maintaining reasonable, professional jobs that diversify our resort community's economy through the support and ongoing development of a lifelong learning culture in Whistler.

This grant addresses the CPI: Protecting the Environment

WWS presents an integrated and holistic Early Childhood curriculum that fosters a deep connection to and understanding of the natural environment, our place within it, and our affects upon it. It is our goal to

demonstrate to our students how they can be instrumental in understanding and acting upon locally significant environmental issues.

We have always had a deep commitment to environmental responsibility and sustainability. We care about the materials that we use in our Group Child Care program, where they come from and who crafted them. We choose to use natural products (both furnishings and toys) that are long lasting, but also recyclable and 100% compostable at the end of their life-cycle.

We are approaching a potential tipping point for the adoption of clean technology products and new renewable energy solutions. \$13,000 to provide much needed bursaries to low income Whistler Residents ages 3 and up to access our sport, therapeutic and recreational programs. Individuals are eligible to apply for up to \$1,000 per year across our four season programming. The bursary covers approximately 30% of the annual Sport Academy fees for our regular Sport Academy athletes and the athletes pay to remaining 70% of their sport fees out of their own discretionary income. Bursary recipients must pass a financial means test and are vetted by a three person Bursary Committee.

Whistler Adaptive anticipates receiving bursary applications from up to 20 Whistler Residents in the next year with physical, sensory and cognitive disabilities. The bursaries will allow them to participate in the following programs: skiing, snowboarding, alpine race, Nordic, swim, triathlon, running, strength & conditioning, hiking, biking, canoeing, kayaking, rowing, stand up paddle boarding, yoga and more.



Introduction

Since 1999, thousands of individuals with disabilities and hundreds of volunteers have been part of the Whistler Adaptive Sports Program.

While Whistler Adaptive Sports Program has successfully run many sport and recreational activities for people with physical, cognitive and sensory disabilities over these years, we are currently challenged to meet the demand for programs and equipment. Adaptive sport has a high degree of complexity for program delivery. There are 3 distinct user groups - all with increasing demands; sea to sky residents, destination visitors, and competitive para sport athletes. Each of these has unique considerations around pricing, promotion, leader training, and equipment.

It is important to note that athletes with autism comprise 60% of Whistler Adaptive Ski and Snowboard clients. This mirrors the rapidly growing global population of individual with autism and in BC alone in 2017 there are an estimated 1,000 children and youth who are formally diagnosed. Understanding and meeting the future needs of youth with autism potentially impacts many program areas such as instructor training and can highly impact revenue models.

Whistler Adaptive's new 2017 - 2021 strategic plan will guide us through our next phase of continued growth by identifying specific desired outcomes and focusing our efforts to be as effective as possible.

The 2017 strategic planning process was the first time since the organization's inception that the board, staff and key partners had a chance to get together and reflect on the vision, mission and goals of the organization moving forward, using input from over two dozen stakeholders and partners.

This strategic plan articulates our new Vision and Mission statements, and describes the goals, desired outcomes and strategic directions that will help guide our continued work over the next five years. The plan is organized into five focus areas in order to focus planning and implementation; however, these focus areas are not distinct, and should be considered in an integrated fashion. The goals and desired outcomes provide long-term directions over five years, while the strategic directions provide the higher-level directions for guiding shorter-term action planning. Our strategic plan is a meaningful living document that will be reviewed by Whistler Adaptive's board and staff on an ongoing basis.

Current Situation

From Whistler Adaptive's roots in providing alpine ski and snowboard programs at Whistler Blackcomb, we have grown to 18 diverse sports and recreation programs across the Sea to Sky Corridor.

An analysis of our internal strengths and weaknesses, as well as external opportunities and threats, a SWOT, is summarized below:

Strengths: Our key strengths lie with the number of winter and summer programs that we are able to offer; the passion and skills of our volunteers and staff; the quality of our equipment and facilities; and our strong partnerships, including with Whistler Blackcomb. We also raise significant funding each year from a variety of sources to support our work.

Weaknesses: Our major weakness is a shortage of staff and a restricted volunteer base, which is especially apparent in our Ski and Snowboard Program. In addition, we identified the need for consistent training and leadership capacity.

The majority of funding comes through 'restricted' sources We are challenged to meet the needs of the Sea to Sky community,

while managing destination programming. Affordability remains a barrier for many to participate with the high

cost to play and stay in the Sea to Sky.

Opportunities: As the Federal and Provincial governments' have brought a spotlight on the need for better inclusion for persons with disabilities, there is work being done in many sectors municipally, provincially and nationally that can create sources of funding and efficiencies to train staff and volunteers.

Furthermore, Vail Resort's ownership of our partner Whistler Blackcomb (WB) potentially offers new opportunities to explore expanded partnerships and programming; there is increasing interest in the Sea to Sky Corridor for additional services; and there is a growing awareness and support for adaptive sports, including competitive streams.

Threats: Ongoing threats remain competition for resources (volunteers and funding), and increasing affordability challenges for those coming to and living in Whistler.

The SWOT was used to inform the strategic directions identified for Whistler Adaptive moving into the next few years of operation.

WHISTLER ADAPTIVE SPORTS PROGRAM

VISION

Empowerment and inclusiveness through sport for individuals with disabilities.

MISSION

To create life-changing opportunities through sport to foster independence, develop memorable experiences, and reach achievable goals.

Description of Whistler Adaptive's Current Programs and Offerings

Whistler Adaptive annually provides 3,000 lessons, to 500 unique individuals, with the support of 180 volunteers.

As a local multi-sport organization, WA currently operates under an Executive Director (ED), supported by contractors who make up one full time equivalent position and seasonal staff hired based on directed funding. The ED leads 85 sport volunteers to deliver 1,800 lessons in year-round multi-sport programs

Whistler Adaptive also contracts Whistler Blackcomb to provide staff and volunteers who lead approximately 1,200 local and destination ski and snowboard programs and lessons in the winter.

Volunteers are primarily trained and certified 'in-house,' partnering with a variety of sport organizations. Core volunteers and staff are provided sport specific training through various National Sport and Adaptive Pathways and Whistler Adaptive training modules. These are the key sports currently offered by Whistler Adaptive and our partners in 2017:

WINTER SPORTS

ALPINE SKIING AND SNOWBOARDING

Alpine skiing and racing and snowboarding for individuals with sensory, cognitive or physical disabilities; partnership with Whistler Blackcomb Resort to offer specialized equipment and therapeutic programming;

Autism (ASD) program designed as an ideal environment for increasing social skills, improving communication, building selfconfidence and self-esteem in an outdoor setting.

ALPINE SKI RACING

For intermediate to advanced skiers with a sensory, physical or cognitive disability, the Whistler Adaptive Alpine Ski Racing program works with athletes to increase their skill set and practice gate training. The goal of this program is to develop each athlete's skills and techniques in order to advance into competitive events.

NORDIC SKIING

Standing and sit Nordic skiing and Biathlon for individuals with sensory, cognitive or physical disabilities taught in Whistler's Lost Lake trails or at Whistler Olympic Park in the beautiful Callaghan Valley.

SWIMMING

Swim Programs are taught weeky in group or individual formats from September to June. Swimmers also have the opportunity to advance into competitive opportunities supported by a swim coach.

YOGA

Weekly yoga is offered in a group format for individuals with physical, sensory and cognitive disabilities.

GYMNASTICS

In partnership with the Oros Gymnastics Centre to provide an integrated program for individuals of varying ages and abilities in gymnastics.

SPORTS PROGRAM

SUMMER SPORTS

HIKING AND TRAIL RIDERS

Hiking and trail riding for participants and their families on adventures from short alpine jaunts and peak-to-peak experiences to full-day technical trails.

BIKING AND HAND-CYCLING

Wide range of biking programs, ranging from cruising the Valley Trail to tackling some of Whistler's off-road offerings, available for individuals with a wide range of abilities.

CANOEING, KAYAKING, ROWING, ADAPTIVE STAND UP PADDLEBOARD, SAILING Canoeing, kayaking, adaptive SUP and rowing programs to build skills and confidence in a controlled and safe environment on scenic Alta Lake and Green Lakes in Whistler and at One Mile Lake with the Pemberton Canoe and Kayak Club.

Sailing experiences delivered in partnership with the Whistler Sailing Association.

YEAR ROUND PROGRAMS

WHISTLER ADAPTIVE SPORT ACADEMY

A multi-sport program operating weekly. In summer, participants will find themselves hiking, canoeing, biking, kayaking, training for triathlons, practicing Yoga, gaining valuable vocational skills through volunteer employment as well as experiencing all that Whistler has to offer. In winter, a similar structure applies with a focus on winter sport.

TRAINING CENTRES

The Whistler Centre for Adaptive Sports offers expanded programs at the Whistler Athletes' Centre, legacies from the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games, with the high performance gym and lodging for athletes and teams who train, compete and live in Whistler, including a strength and conditioning gym and gymnastics facility, and the Whistler Athletes Lodge, which provides 75 accessible rooms, a self-catering kitchen and 20 town homes.

The Jeff Harbers Adaptive Sports Centre on Whistler Mountain allows the Whistler Adaptive Ski and Snowboard, Adaptive Alpine Race and Alpine Hiking/Trail Rider programs to thrive and increase visibility within the sport community.

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Building off the success of the Canada's luge athletes at the 2018 Winter Olympic Games, BCLA is seeking funding to further expand our luge exposure program, Learn to Luge, for the 2018/2019 season. The learn-to-luge sessions allow youth interested in trying the sport of luge to attend a training session at the Whistler Sliding Centre, run by a dedicated luge coach, and supported by members of BC Luge. Learn to Luge sessions are offered to the public with the intention of growing awareness and participation for the sport. This season to date, we have had over 100 new athletes try the sport and have had six new athletes join our luge programs. We would like to continue to build on this momentum and continue to recruit new athletes into the sport of luge.

BCLA experienced a loss of direct funding from our government sport partners and as of 2017/2018 season, we have partnered with Whistler Sport Legacies (WSL) to continue to offer the sport of luge in Whistler. WSL help supports the base sliding programs, while BC Luge continues with its efforts to raise awareness of the sport and recruit new athletes into the sport. Accordingly, we are seeking funding to grow the program to its full potential through advertising, promotional collaternal, as well as targeting the local schools and organized sport groups (e.g. ski clubs) to increase interest in luge. Funds will also assist in offsetting the costs of organizing the learn-to-luge program, making it more affordable and attainable for youth throughout the corridor.

Following the success of last years program, the purpose of the grant is to continue the in-house coach development and we are hoping to add two more days to have 4 days total. One day to focus on each of the following elements; environmental, Physical, Technical & Tactical.

Coach Development - We currently have 5 Full-time coaches and 26 part-time coaches through the season. Most of the part-time coaches are in full-time employment of education through the week and coaching all day Saturday / Sunday.

Due to the nature of ski coaching, there is very little time for formal 'in-house' coach training. We have been adding sessions to the end of the work days, however this compromises the time available for coaches to do review and planning sessions / meeting with athletes. Therefore, in order to ensure development to a professional level we would like to have a weekend of staff training prior to the season, and a coach who can dedicate two days per week throughout the season to ensure ongoing training with the coaches. Of these two days one would be to develop content, and one day for hands on coach development.

No. We started it last year and already there is a positive impact in getting all the coaches aligned and talking the same terminology with shared and agreed definitions.

The community benefits are the same this year from last year. Specifically

that our organization provides ski training programs for skiers aged between 10-20 years old. Our mission is to 'Develop Champions in Life and in Sport'. The sport, combined with the programs, teach young people a tremendous amount about how to plan for success, to face challenges and look for solutions to personal challenges by using the team around them. Furthermore, we promote a healthy sporting lifestyle and the time commitment results in a great deal of time outside and partaking in sport at a time when young people have to many electronic and inside distractions.

Many of these young athletes go on to succeed in business and sport and as a result act as great ambassadors for Whistler, for skiing, for sport and the values that we promote. Furthermore, our organization competes in local, provincial and national competitions around Canada, whilst also hosting the only International Children's ski race in North America which attracts over 400 competitors from over 20 countries.

These efforts have raised the profile of Cross Country skiing in the community and delivered expanded youth and adult programs. Our board has two new members with kids in our programs. This provides for continued succession and energy in growing the sport of Cross Country Skiing in the community.

For those embarking on a walking or biking tour of the valley, Sundays at The Point provides a stopover mid-way around the valley where participants can relax, enjoy the arts offerings and refuel before returning to the village. While most of PARC's programming is financially self-sufficient, the free open houses, which have no admission fee but accrue many expenses (rent, insurance, permits, staff, artist fees, supplies, etc.), require some financial support to break even. After a successful summer in 2017, PARC has reduced its funding request for Sundays at The Point.

This year, PARC is also seeking funding for its increasing administrative workload, specifically in the areas of bookkeeping, grant-writing and marketing. For the first time, PARC's annual budget will reach \$100,000 in 2017/18. The revenue is almost entirely generated through PARC's arts activities, a feat that is extremely rare among arts organizations. Administering a budget of this size and continuing to offer this level of programming with one part-time staff member and no core funding (PARC received 3.75% of its budget from the municipality in 2017) is threatening the ongoing success of the organization. PARC is seeking temporary funding in this area only until it can secure a source of core funding and establish a new arrangement with the RMOW once plans for a West Side cultural precinct are developed and approved, hopefully within two years. PARC has received a Member Group Grant from Arts Whistler for its 2018 Flag Stop Theatre & Arts Festival (\$750). PARC has applied for \$3500 from BC Arts Council for the Flag Stop Festival and children's and adult theatre camps leading up to the festival. This grant was approved in 2015, 2016 and 2017. PARC's fundraising programs include an annual fundraising dinner (approx. \$8500), and Alta Lake Ice-Break Raffle (approx. \$1000). PARC's private sponsorships and in-kind sponsorships allow it to raise further funds through a number of its arts events (2017-18, approx. \$7,500) There is currently no rejected or unapproved funding.

With approved CEP funding to hire a grant writer in 2018, PARC will strive to secure other funding from provincial, federal and private sector sources.

For the past three years, PARC has applied for CEP funding solely for its Sundays at The Point series, a free open house event for members of the community and visitors to the resort which nonetheless has many expenses involved in its production.

This year, PARC is also seeking funding for its increasing administrative workload, specifically in the areas of bookkeeping, grant-writing and marketing. For the first time, PARC's annual budget will reach \$100,000 in 2017/18. The revenue is almost entirely generated through PARC's arts activities, a feat that is extremely rare among arts organizations. Administering a budget of this size and continuing to offer this level of programming with one part-time staff member and no core funding (PARC received 3.75% of its budget from the municipality in 2017) is threatening the ongoing success of the organization.

In 2016 PARC put forth a proposal to the RMOW for a longer term operating agreement which would put the organization in a more secure and stable position. Such an arrangement is currently on hold until plans for a West Side cultural precinct are completed over the next two to three years. In the meantime, PARC will continue to grow. In 2018 it will become a GST collecting organization increasing its bookkeeping and administrative workload. PARC is seeking a small amount of funding for this as well as a grant writer which will enable the organization to apply for funding from various government programs to try to achieve a core level of funding. The third part of the administrative funding would enable the hiring of a marketing person to continue to drive sales to PARC's programs which is key to our financial success. We hope that an increased CEP grant over the next two years will allow the organization to get through this transition period and achieve more stable funding from various sources as plans for a West Side cultural precinct are developed, and a longer term arrangement established with the RMOW.

Please find attached an application from the Whistler Singers for the 2018 Community Enrichment Program.

Established in 1984, the Whistler Singers' mandate is to provide positive musical and social opportunities for the adults and youth in our community. The Whistler Singers has been a fixture in this community for 34 years but in the last 5 years they have seen a period of dynamic growth amongst its members. Everyone is welcome in the choir and we have teens to seniors as members, making us multigenerational. Singers from Squamish and Pemberton join the Whistler choristers every Wednesday night to make a joyous noise and connect socially. Singing in a choir and making music is a lifelong opportunity for all.

The Singers have always been community minded, and the summer of 2017 saw the formation of an 'O Canada' choir to sing at two municipal events – the presentation of the Sovereign's Medal by the Governor General and the Canadian Citizenship Ceremony. Every April the members of the Whistler Singers volunteer for the Whistler Music Festival held in our town. This fall the Singers supported the Whistler Skating Club by singing at their winter show. The spring concert of 2017 was a joint concert with the Sea to Sky Singers of Squamish. We held two joint concerts – one at the Britannia Mine, and the other here is Whistler. Four massed choir songs were sung by both choirs; it was a wonderful experience.

The Whistler Singers participate in Whistler's annual observance of the municipal Remembrance Day ceremony. During November and December, the choir sang for events at the Fairmont Chateau Whistler, the Winter Bazaar as well as presenting their usual full-length Christmas concert with musical guest 'Chicks with Picks' from Pemberton. The choir also co-hosts the Christmas Eve Service of Lessons and Carols. Currently, the choir is preparing for our annual spring concert (May 4th).

The Whistler Singers now have a formal executive committee to oversee the future of the group. As part of revitalizing the choir the decision was made to recognize the musical leadership and talented contributions made by the director and accompanist. The choir would not have experienced this dynamic change without the guidance of the current director.

Our application is to assist us to continue to build our music library and help offset the cost of performance venues, and also to assist with the honorariums for the director and the accompanist.



Every year, in October, the WVQG brings in an instructor to teach a 2 day workshop on a new and interesting quilting technique. This not only keeps the quilting interesting and exciting, it improves our technique and abilities and enthusiasm to make interesting and innovative quilts both for personal use but also for the comfort quilts we provide to the community at large. This year we have the opportunity to learn from Barb Mortell who is a respected North Shore quilt artist and teacher. The funding we are requesting is to cover the costs incurred to have Barb teach the 2 day workshop here in Whistler.

In the year May 2016-May 2017 the WVQG donated hundreds of ice bag covers to the medical center, 32 comfort quilts to local people who had needed support while recovering from house fires, health crisis, newly arriving as refugees and to some supportive BC agencies (we have donated 7 quilts so far this year with 25 quilts finished and ready to give out). We made and donated 364 blocks and put together 14 tops ready to be quilted to the Canada 150 Project through the Canadian Quilters Association to be included in the over 2000 quilts made last year and distributed to Ronald McDonald Houses across Canada. All of this was done in addition to our own personal quilting projects.
