GRANT INFORMATION

Project funding is being requested for the "Protect Priority Habitats, Preserve Our Future" public education campaign. The short term objective of this campaign in 2025 is to provide free public education and raise awareness about environmental stewardship as it relates to priority habitats in Whistler, through supporting research and innovation to conserve critical ecosystems. We aim to do this in collaboration with the RMOW and other environmental organizations in the area, including but not limited to, The Whistler Naturalists, SSISC, Whistler Lakes Foundation, and others to support the strategic goals of the Priority Habitat Framework. The longer term objective is to build off these educational opportunities in supporting policy development for the implementation of sustainable land-use practices that protect biodiversity for future generations.

Project Scope includes:

Community Engagement and Education:

Collaborate with the RMOW and support the strategic goals of the Priority Habitat Framework. Develop and provide educational materials in the way of in-person events to inform residents, businesses, and visitors about the importance of preserving priority habitats. Promote the concept of environmental stewardship, encouraging individuals and groups to take an active role in protecting local ecosystems.

Habitat Protection:

Work with partnering organizations like the Whistler Naturalists, SSISC and members to monitor critical habitats within the RMOW boundaries that require protection, including old and ancient forests, riparian zones, wetlands, and wildlife corridors.

Strengthen Local Conservation:

Enhanced environmental policies and land-use practices that better protect Whistler's priority habitats from development, pollution, and climate change impacts.

Collaboration and Partnerships:

Advocate for the protection of priority habitats as they relate to this campaign, through participation on the RMOW Climate and Environment Committee. Build partnerships with local government, Indigenous communities, conservation organizations, and scientists to ensure the long-term protection of priority habitats. Engage in policy advocacy to strengthen local environmental protection laws and habitat preservation initiatives.

2. Is This a New Program or Activity?

If yes, what are your targets and goals for this program/activity?

Habitat protection, conservation and public education have been a part of AWARE's mission and ongoing work for the last 36 years. The particular focus on priority habitats and the proposed engagement activities are new. The project has three clear, measurable goals.

GOAL 1: Increase Public Awareness

Objective: Increase public awareness of priority habitats and environmental stewardship by engaging a minimum of 300 individuals through a series of speaker panels, guided tours, and/or workshops on critical ecosystems over the next 12 months.

GOAL 2: Support Research and Innovation

Objective: Provide opportunities for at least 3 local research projects focused on ecosystem conservation to share their research during the campaign. We have already been in discussion with Dr. Peter Ross (Raincoast Foundation - Sky to Sea Healthy Waters project in partnership with Whistler Lakes Foundation), SSISC on research of invasives and their impact on priority habitats, Bob Brett research on wildlife species and habitats in around Whistler Naturalists and Birders.

GOAL 3: Increase Community Engagement

Objective: Increase community engagement at the 3 in person events and through our online channels including e-news and social media by 20% within the 12 months. Hope to build on each engagement opportunity.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

- Volunteer participation increased from 174 in 2023 to 203 in 2024.
- Program participation increased from 3975 in 2023 to 4251 in 2024.
- Membership increased from 144 in 2023 to 156 in 2024.
- 11,464 lbs of locally grown food at our GROW Community Gardens & Greenhouses, saving an estimated 17,196 lbs of CO₂e by reducing food miles, industrial farming, and waste. GROW program is fully subscribed with members growing their own local produce and building food security in part of the community.
- 150+ youth engaged in local climate action initiatives, empowering the next generation to take leadership on environmental issues. Youth in both junior and high school get exposure to environmental issues in their community and are encouraged to undertake projects aimed at education of the wider community, elimination of threats to the environment or alignment and collaboration with interest groups to build momentum on climate responses.
- In 2024, AWARE delivered both the spring and fall Go By Bike Weeks and using the Go By Bike BC metrics, we saw our community log a total of 21,400km of biking and 4,640kg of GHG saved across the weeks of the events. The initiative is aligned with the Resort Municipality of Whistler's (RMOW) climate action goals, particularly its greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets and the RMOW Active Transportation Strategy.
- 8,818 lbs of waste diverted from landfills through our Zero Waste initiatives, helping to reduce Whistler's carbon footprint. Zero waste Heroes continues to play a pivotal role in diverting waste from landfill. Community becomes more familiar with the program.
- 600+ community members participating in circular economy initiatives like Community Garage Sales and Repair Cafes, setting new standards for sustainable consumption. Community at large become better aware and educated in environmental matters. In the first year of our new strategy AWARE will concentrate on community awareness of circular economy with particular attention to wasteful behaviours. The initiative is aligned with the Resort Municipality of Whistler's (RMOW) climate action goals, particularly its greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction targets and the Zero-Waste Action Plan
- 2,425 lbs of clothing diverted from landfills through our Clothing Swaps, reducing waste, saving money and setting a new standard for consumption.
- Over 100 events, talks, and workshops connecting Whistler's residents and visitors to environmental initiatives and fostering greater awareness of sustainability.
- AWARE is an active participant in the new RMOW Climate & Environment Committee
- AWARE has partnered up with the RMOW and GFL on a Zero Waste Campaign with a focus on organics, supporting the community to divert organics going to landfill.

On November 19, 2024 the RMOW staff presented a Report to Council about the Priority Habitat Framework and updated Priority Habitat mapping. The Priority Habitat Framework is an overarching planning guide that will help the RMOW achieve the OCP's goals, objectives, and policies with respect to the natural environment. It provides a comprehensive review of existing programs, biodiversity monitoring and protection efforts, and recommends actions the RMOW can take to further their goals for protecting the health of Whistler's most important natural assets. There are five goals listed as recommendations in this framework and this project aligns with Goal #5 - Increase knowledge about Priority Habitats and promote stewardship to protect them. The Priority Habitat Framework aligns with AWARE's goals and Strategic Plan.
