# 1. Purpose of Grant

Zero Ceiling is seeking \$10,000 in funding to support our equal access to the outdoors program, Adventure Sessions. While many believe we mostly serve youth from Vancouver, in fact, 50% of our participants come from the Sea to Sky area, including Whistler, Squamish, Squamish Nation Lil'Wat Nation, and N'Quatqua Nation. Your support will help us provide youth from these communities with the opportunity to participate in the mountain recreation that is the heart of our community, when historically they have not had access.

Adventure Sessions is a program that provides equitable access to skiing, snowboarding, hiking, and mountain biking for marginalized youth aged 16-27. In BC, the majority of residents have access to outdoor recreation, but the most vulnerable young people do not. Our programs are designed to bridge that gap and provide access to the physical and mental health benefits of outdoor recreation for youth who have been marginalized, including Indigenous, visible minority, and 2SLGBTQIA+ youth. The program is low-barrier, providing the equipment, instruction, and access required by youth, at no cost to themselves. The program connects over 500 young people to outdoor recreation, the mountain and Whistlers culture. We work with youth agencies who refer youth to the program such as the Foundry Sea to Sky Youth Hub, Sea to Sky Alternative School, Squamish Nation, N'Quatqua Snowboarding and Lil'wat Nation, to give youth access to Whistler's mountains.

We partner with Whistler Blackcomb to deliver these programs in a safe and inclusive environment. While we receive in-kind donations of lift tickets, lessons, and rental equipment from Whistler Blackcomb, we are seeking funding for our skilled youth workers to deliver the program and our operations coordinator who handles program administration to ensure our services are safe, inclusive, and accessible for the diverse youth who we serve. Funding from the CEP Grant program will directly support the wages of the program staff and our operations coordinator staff who are responsible for managing and facilitating Adventure Sessions year-round.

### 2. Is This a New Program or Activity?

No, Adventure Sessions is not a new program. It has been a core part of Zero Ceiling since the organization's founding in 1997. Connecting youth to the mountains has been the foundation upon which Zero Ceiling was built. Our mission has always been to provide youth from underrepresented and marginalized communities with the opportunity to engage in outdoor recreation, develop new skills, and build a deeper connection with nature.

## 3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

Zero Ceiling continues to provide opportunities in the Sea to Sky for youth who live here. As a world class destination, the reality that every family is not able to afford these experiences is a known challenge. Zero Ceiling, and the programming it provides, helps youth feel more connected to their own community. The goal of any community is to provide the best foundation for those who live and grow up here. Zero Ceiling eliminates barriers so that there are opportunities for everyone to experience access to the outdoors. Whistler Blackcomb adventures are available to so many more youth, thanks to Zero Ceiling. Some of the youth from this season said they had the best time of their life on the hill. Think about that. Without this experience, someone might be missing their most formative memory. We all have one. Imagine your life without yours. That's why this program is so powerful, because it provides something that can never be taken away no matter how many struggles youth face in their future." – Youth Agency Support Worker

Adventure Sessions not only connects youth to outdoor recreation but also provides significant community benefits. The program contributes to the employment of three local community members—our Program Manager, Youth Case Worker, and Operations Coordinator. It engages one of Whistler's largest stakeholders, Whistler leakscomb, and encourages Whistler's ski and snowboard instructors to connect with a deeper cause. Additionally, Adventure Sessions creates regular volunteer opportunities for Whistler loss, enabling them to give back to their community and connect with a local nonprofit. This program has also become integrated into the Resort Municipality of Whistler's efforts to celebrate and share its mountain culture, ensuring that access to the mountains is open to those who are often excluded.

Adventure Sessions runs every Wednesday and Thursday, offering regular volunteer opportunities for community members. Volunteers can actively participate in outdoor sessions, providing mentorship and support for youth. This is an opportunity to connect with a meaningful cause and build stronger ties to a local nonprofit organization.

Community Connection:
The program has fostered lasting connections between Whistler Blackcomb's ski and snowboard instructors and the local community. Adventure Sessions has become a way for instructors to engage more deeply with the town and its reside Through the program, they build meaningful ties to the community by supporting youth and sharing their passion for the mountains.

Each year, we typically have about 50 days of Adventure Sessions, which translates to 50 days x 3 instructors + at least 1 volunteer = a total of 200 community contribution days.

Access to Whistler's Mountain Culture:
Adventure Sessions serves as a platform for the Resort Municipality of Whistler to share and celebrate its mountain culture, opening access to the mountain for those who are often excluded Indigenous, visible minority, and 2SLGBTQIA+ youth.
The program ensures that youth from diverse backgrounds can experience the outdoor activities that Whistler is known for, creating an inclusive environment where all can thrive in the mountains and connect to the land.

#### 6. Additional Information:

Adventure Sessions is an equitable outdoor program in Whistler that provides marginalized youth with no-cost access to the mountain in a safe and inclusive environment. The program has been running confidently for 28 years, offering year-round opportunities for youth to engage with the outdoors. However, we have never had any ongoing funding to deliver the program. As demand for the program grows, we are seeing our sessions book out quickly, with youth often placed on a waiting list. This program relies on the support of the community to continue its vital work, and we greatly appreciate your consideration and support.

The below testimonials were provided by youth workers and supporters who referred youth to our equal access to the outdoors programs over the last few years. They're happy for us to share their experiences to demonstrate the impact the program has had for youth and the community.

"Zero Ceiling helps youth feel more connected to their own community. The goal of any community is to provide the best foundation for those who live and grow up here. Zero Ceiling eliminates barriers so that there are opportunities for everyone to experience access to the outdoors."

"Zero Ceiling provides an integral connection in the community that reduces barriers and brings us all closer together. Living in the sea to sky corridor is challenging for many marginalized folks. There is a misunderstanding that if you live in Whistler, or Squamish, or Pemberton, you have incredible access to all these activities. Many of the youth I work with had never been to Whistler, never been mountain biking, and may never have done so if not for Zero Ceiling. If Zero Ceiling didn't exist, I do not know what this community might look like -- and I am not interested in finding out."

With Zero Ceiling staff there is awareness of other support systems in the corridor (and the Work 2 Live program that inspires youth to consider more options for their future)."

Housing - Working with Community Partners on Long-Term Housing Strategy

- Zero Ceiling plays an active role in contributing to the housing priorities outlined in the RMOW Strategic Plan by providing long-term housing solutions for youth. We maintain a strong, positive working relationship with the Whistler Housing Authority and currently hold a 3-bedroom unit occupied by Zero Ceiling graduates. These graduates have lived, worked, and contributed to the community of Whistler for over 24 months. One of our graduates is now coaching local youth sports, showing the long-term impact of our programs on youth who remain active and engaged in the community.
- In 2024, Zero Ceiling secured housing through the Whistler Valley Housing Society for youth in the Work 2 Live program. We rent five units to support youth in the community, marking a significant first partnership of its kind in Whistler. We are proud to lead by example, demonstrating how collaboration between nonprofits and housing organizations can help create more equitable, inclusive housing solutions in Whistler.
- The Resort Municipality of Whistler's 2024 Vulnerable Populations Housing Needs Assessment identifies a current need for 22 supportive housing beds for marginalized youth in the Sea to Sky Corridor. Zero Ceiling currently provides 11 of these beds, and as part of our five-year strategic plan, we aim to expand and provide 22 beds of supportive housing to youth.

#### Community Engagement:

- Zero Ceiling is dedicated to fostering strong community connections in Whistler. We work in partnership with several local organizations, including the Whistler Community Services Society, Whistler Valley Housing Society, Whistler Housing Authority, Whistler Community Foundation, Whistler Blackcomb, Evo and Nesters Market. Through these partnerships, we help create meaningful linkages between community members, organizations, Whistler's workforce, and local businesses.
- Zero Ceiling addresses community engagement priorities with the Nations through various initiatives, such as removing barriers to the land and outdoor recreation through Adventure Sessions, accepting Indigenous youth referrals and welcoming them into our Work2Live program (which offers supportive housing and employment), and running our Auntie Program, which fosters healing and reconciliation for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous youth.

#### SUPPORT FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

The RMOW is committed to working with the Lilwat People, known in their language as L'il'wat7úl and the Squamish People, known in their language as the Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw to: create an enduring relationship; establish collaborative processes for planning on unceded territories, as currently managed by the provincial government; achieve mutual objectives; and enable participation in Whistler's resort economy.

- 9. How has your organization considered truth and reconciliation with the Indigenous Nations?
- For years, Zero Ceiling has been committed to reconciling with the Nations by providing free access to outdoor recreation in their territory. Youth from the N'Quatqua Nation, Lil'Wat Nation, and Skwxwú7mesh Nation are active participants in our Adventure Sessions program. Through these sessions, they gain access to the land and outdoor activities that should never be excluded from them. For many of these youth, Adventure Sessions sparks a love for mountain sports, where they can connect deeply with nature and the land. Some have visited the program multiple times as it provides them with their first experience on Whistler Blackcomb Mountain.
- At Zero Ceiling, decolonization work is embedded in our organizational structure and strategic plan. In 2022-2023, we contracted an Indigenous-led consultant company to conduct an anti-racism audit of our programs and operations. The feedback from this audit has helped us identify both our strengths and areas for ongoing growth and improvement. We have since integrated the audit's recommendations into the design of all our programs, organizational structure, operations, and strategic planning.
- We run an Indigenous-led program, the Auntie Program, which is designed to support reconciliation through cultural revitalization, enhancing understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples, and supporting youth experiencing or at risk of homelessness. We contract two Indigenous Elders from the Skwxwú7mesh Nation to manage this program in collaboration with our Program Manager. The Aunties are maternal figures who share teachings, traditions, crafts, and cultural guidance with both youth and staff. This initiative fosters an environment of healing and understanding while empowering youth participants.
