The purpose of this grant is to assist WYSC to cover a small amount of costs to keep soccer affordable for all its members as one of a handful of teamsports available in Whistler.

- #1. Junior Coaches Wages \$2,000.00 To asisst with off setting some of the wages of our Junior coaches who provide on field instruction to our players from preschool to U9. The coaches are an invaluable assest on the field ensuring all players experience a quality sport experience. Our youngest players have the most coaches on the field to provide them with the best chances of competent skill development, game modelling and FUN!
- #2. Coaching Courses \$1,500.00 We will be having a BC Soccer Certified Instructor come up to Whistler to deliver 2 Canada Soccer Certified coaching courses (FUNdamentals and Learn to Train) as well as provide on field direction to all of our coaches over two training days. To keep costs down, the instructor will be staying with friends. The requested \$1,500.00 will go towards coovering the cost of hosting the two courses as well as cover a portion of each coach's fee to attend the course(s).
- #3. Tournament Entry Fees \$2,500.00 Each year we send our U10 to U18 Teams to tournaments throughout the lower mainland and the Okanagan. We try to have each of our competitive teams enter one tournament in the Spring and one in the Fall. We anticipate having 7 teams this year able to participate in these events. Tournaments are an opportunity to experience soccer on a broader scale playing against teams from further away and with various skills then they usually do in league play. Tournaments are also an opportunity to build friendships and build team culture.

This is not a new program. The Whistler Youth Soccer Club has been providing soccer programming to the Youth of Whistler for 27 years.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

Our number one community benefit is our soccer programming that offers the youth of Whistler an opportunity to play a low cost team sport that offers skill development, comraderie and fitness. Although we have to abbreviate our season once the snow falls, we are able to put multiple teams in the BC Coastal Soccer League, the North Shore Youth Soccer Interlock League for our younger players and offer special clinics to anyone who wishes to get certified, enahnce their skills or gain greater fitness. This past year, The Whistler Youth Soccer Club ran our annual soccer programs for youth ages 4 - 18 years. WYSC hosted 2 referee clinics in the Spring, that were full with people attending from Whistler, Squamish, Pemberton and the City. We also hosted one Canada Soccer coaching course that was well attended. WYSC also offered an Intensive Goalie Camp in the Fall with a visiting coach from the Okanagan. Sport is important for both physical and mental health.

- 1. WYSC has a strong list of rotating adult volunteer coaches as well as a pool of Jr coaches who volunteer to support our House programs from preschool to U10. We also have a smaller pool of certified coaches who have committed to being trained and certified with Canada Soccer certified courses. All of our coaches dedicate many hours both on and off the field to our organization. The coaches and managers ensure our members enjoy quality age-appropriate programming. Many of our Jr coaches are high school or University students who have aged out of our programming but wish to continue to be involved with soccer.
- 2. WYSC provides local youth the opportunity to participate in low-cost, year-round sport that encourages a healthy lifestyle through exercise and connecting with peers through sport. By offering full season teams at the older age groups, we hope to foster a greater sense of team and belonging that encourages players to continue to play well into high school and beyond. We are proud of the number of players we have at the U13 U18 age groups. Our U18 girls team alone had 26 players on the roster this year.
- 3. WYSC looks for opportunities to give back to the community wherever possible. This past year, we offered at no cost to the schools, soccer instruction to grades K 7 for 2 weeks each. The program aims to provide mentorship to the teachers to increase their competence and confidence to teach soccer while exposing the students to soccer and hopefully inspiring some to carry on playing. By offering this in schools we are removing any barriers to participation.

WYSC makes older equipment accessible at the field should someone who no ball wants to kick the ball around. Our Head Coach leaves old balls on the deck for anyone to use. WYSC also has players and their families who have moved away contacting us when they are in town to use a ball and have a kick around.

WYSC also participates in the annual Community Clean Up day each year in April. Our U10 – U18 teams head out in their teams to help in the clean-up of our designated areas.

- 4. WYSC continues to provide two \$500 scholarships to graduating high school students each to 2 graduates who has shown exceptional characteristics whilst being a member of our organization which is used towards post-secondary education.
- 5. WYSC encourages older members to become qualified as referees or coaches and supports and mentors them on the field. This helps them become confident in their capacity to referee and coach to provides them with another opportunity to keep active and involved in the community.
