This grant would help cover the wages of the facilitator for our playgroup program. Over the course of the year, we plan to offer a 2.5-hour playgroup three times a week (on Tuesdays and Thursdays) year-round. During the cooler months, the playgroup takes place indoors in the Millar Room at the Myrtle Phillip Community Centre, while in the warmer summer months, it moves outdoors to one of the local parks. This translates to approximately 250 hours of playgroup time for Whistler families with young children.

Occasionally, we also have guest speakers from other community services attend the program to connect with families and share valuable information. Playgroups provide parents with the opportunity to learn from each other, improve their parenting skills, gain knowledge about their children's needs, and build a strong social support. Children who participate in playgroups during early childhood experience better developmental outcomes when they start school. These benefits are seen across all areas of development: physical, social, emotional, language, cognitive, and communication. This is why playgroups are so crucial.

This playgroup program is an upstream initiative that helps prevent the need for more expensive interventions down the road. The purpose of this grant is to support the operation of a playgroup for Whistler families with young children.

The playgroup is part of our Child Care Resource and Referral (CCRR) program, with the Whistler CCRR consultant serving as the facilitator. For more information, you can visit our CCRR page: CCRR Playgroups

Early childhood experiences have a profound impact on long-term health, education, and employment outcomes. There is a critical window of opportunity from ages 0 to 6 to set children on a positive trajectory towards health, education, and employment. Adverse experiences such as low income, poverty, neglect, and food insecurity can delay a child's development and lead to poor future outcomes. The primary influencers on a child's early experiences are their parents or caregivers. Many Canadian parents lack the skills, resources, or knowledge needed to provide nurturing early experiences for their children.

Canadian children are experiencing increasingly delayed development, as reflected by the Early Development Instrument (EDI), which measures five key areas of early childhood growth that predict future health, education, and social outcomes.

Recent data shows that 28% of Canadian children are vulnerable in one or more areas of development when tested in Kindergarten (CIHI, 2022), an increase from 26% in 2014 (CIHI, 2014). In British Columbia, the rate of vulnerability is even higher, with 34.6% of children starting school with developmental weaknesses in areas critical to their health, and this trend is rising (HELP, 2016).

In Whistler specifically, there has been a noticeable rise in the percentage of children entering the school system with vulnerabilities. For more detailed information, visit the Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP) at UBC and explore their EDI dashboard:https://dashboard.earlylearning.ubc.ca.

Many children also face adverse childhood experiences that contribute to developmental delays and poor health outcomes. Almost one in five Canadian children live in poverty (First Call, 2021), and food bank usage, even before the pandemic, reached record highs in certain regions, with children disproportionately affected (Ghoussoub, 2016). Additionally, one in three Canadian children endure physical or sexual abuse, exposure to intimate partner violence, or a combination of these factors (Boesveld, 2014), with neglect rates likely even higher (Trocmé, 2005). The Child Care Resource and Referral (CCRR) through playgroups addresses these challenges by supporting the most vulnerable families, helping them provide the best environments for their children's development.

We acknowledge with gratitude that we live and work on the unceded ancestral territories of the Coast Salish Peoples and Lil'wat Nation, serving the Sea to Sky Corridor of Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish) and Stl'atl'imx Nations, Lil'wat (Mt. Currie), Samahquam, Skatin, Xa'xtsa (Douglas) and N'Quatqua Nations. At SSCS, we are committed to supporting Truth and Reconciliation recommendations through intentional and meaningful partnerships and program delivery.

For more than 40 years, Sea to Sky Community Services has focused on creating positive change in the communities we serve. Throughout the years, we've added new services, overcome challenges and worked to reflect the needs of Sea to Sky residents. We know there is still much more we can do.

Our mission as an organization is to provide high-quality programs throughout the Sea to Sky corridor. With compassion, respect, and care we strive to enhance the lives of every resident at every age and stage of life, recognizing, and respecting the variety of cultures, races, backgrounds, religions and creeds we find here in our region. We are committed to creating opportunities for indigenous and non-indigenous community members to work together, in good relations, toward common goals.

Here are some examples of the work we have engaged in:

On September 29 we are honoured to invite Seesaxwalia (Aggie Andrews) and Slomish, two community leaders from Squamish Nation, and Lois Joseph, the Manager of the Lilwat7úl Culture Centre to share their thoughts and stories on the lasting legacy of Canada's Residential Schools with SSCS staff. They will also lead us in a moment of silence for all of the lost children.

On September 30, we are humbled to be participating in the second annual Canoe Pull happening on National Day for Truth and Reconciliation at Alice Lake Provincial Park.

SSCS Youth Services is partnering with Squamish Nation and the Integrated First Nations Unit at the Squamish RCMP. Everyone involved gathers together – wearing orange – to paddle the Little Thunderbird canoe. Youth who have participated in the Paddle Carving program with See Appl-tun/ Art Harry will once again have the chance to put their own hand-carved paddles into the water.

In addition, the youth services team is planning a drum-making workshop for youth later in the fall, so that, over time, they will be able to bring their own drums to events such as the September 30 TRC | Solidarity walk down Cleveland Avenue.

Through nature walks led by First Nation knowledge keepers, SSCS staff gain opportunities to learn about the land on which we work. We have so much to learn about the cultural practices and histories related to the forests, estuaries, rivers and riparian areas where our offices and programs take place.

Our Diversity committee has compiled a lending library of books Indigenous authors so SSCS staff can continue their learning journey.

SSCS is also in the process of developing more consistent consultation practices with our partners in the Southern Stl'atl'imx nations. The plan is to ensure that all future grant opportunities for our operations in the region will be grounded in meaningful consultation.

SSCS' Diversity committee compiled and distributed a list of resources to assist staff with their journey to Truth and Reconciliation. These resources are available for everyone and we encourage you to explore them if they resonate with you.

While we continue taking steps—large and small—on this journey, we are energized by this work and the knowledge that the future will hold many new, exciting opportunities for creating a more diverse, equitable and inclusive world.
